USITT's 2011 elections saw record participation, with almost 30 percent of members voting either electronically or using paper ballots.

Lea Asbell-Swanger was elected to a one-year term as President-Elect, and will then automatically move into the position of President. Her President-Elect term starts July 1, and she will assume the presidency on July 1, 2012.

Sherry Wagner-Henry was elected Secretary, David R. Krajec Vice-President for Commissions, Marketa Fantova Vice-President for International Activities, and David W. Will Vice-President for Conferences.

Also serving three-year terms are Directors Dan Culhane, Jennifer L. Knott, Andi Lyons, Kevin Rigdon, Loren Schreiber, and Joe Tilford. All officers and directors start their terms on July 1.

Nominations are open for the following 2012 Board of Director positions: Treasurer; Vice-President for Communication; Vice-President for Members, Sections & Chapters; Vice-President for Programming; Vice-President Special Operations; and six Directors. Once completed nomination forms are collected, the committee will develop the 2012 USITT Board of Directors Election slate. The slate will be presented and voted by the membership next fall.



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Offer ETCP Exams in Charlotte

All three ETCP examinations will be given at USITT's Annual Conference & Stage Expo in Charlotte, North Carolina.

The entertainment electrician exam is scheduled for Friday, March 11; the arena rigging exam is to be given the morning of Saturday, March 12 and the theatre rigging exam is scheduled for that afternoon. USITT members receive a discount to take any exam, and candidates who wish to take multiple exams will receive a discount for the second exam.

Interested applicants must submit their application, along with supporting materials and fee, to the ETCP office no later than February 10, 2011. Space is limited.

Draft Chain Hoist Standard, Extensions to RDM Available



Two draft standards have been posted for public review on the PLASA website through February 7.

BSR E1.6-2–201x, Entertainment Technology -- Design, Inspection, and Maintenance of Electric Chain Hoists for the Entertainment Industry, deals with chain hoists used in the entertainment industry as part of a performance or in preparation for a performance.

BSR E1.37-1–201x, Additional Message Sets for ANSI E1.20 (RDM) - Part 1, Dimmer Message Sets, is part of the BSR E1.37 project to add additional features to RDM. This part provides additional get/set parameter messages (PIDs) that are intended for, but are not limited to, use with entertainment lighting dimming systems. These additional messages allow access to configuration parameters commonly found in many theatrical dimming systems.

Members of the public who are interested these issues are invited to comment on the draft standards.

New Project to Draft Stage Lift Safety Standard

PLASA has started work on a new project to write an American National Standard: BSR E1.42 – 201x, *Entertainment Technology – Installed Stage Lift Safety Standard*. Stage lifts, such as orchestra pits or theatre forestage lifts, are not the subject of any current national standard. As result, safety requirements and inspections are inconsistent. This project is to develop a standard for stage lifts that can be referenced by the International Code Council and the National Fire Protection Association. The scope is limited to safety and to lifts that are installed as a part of the building and that are not for a single theatrical production. Any person involved in the design, manufacture, use, or inspection of stage lifts and who is willing to actively work on the project is invited to join the new working group. A working group application form is available on the PLASA website.

USITT President Joe Aldridge has named Loren Schrieber as the principle and Dan Brinker as the alternate USITT person on this project.

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
To Present Distinguished Achievement Awards

Six individuals with outstanding records of achievement in a specific segment of the industry will be honored at the 2011 Annual Conference & Stage Expo. Each will be a featured part of the Conference in a special session presented by one of the Commissions.

The individuals and their areas of expertise are: Carrie Robbins, Costume Design & Technology; William J. Byrnes, Management; R. Craig Wolf, Education; Dennis Dorn, Technical Production; Cesar Pelli, Architecture; and John C. Scheffler, Scene Design.

Distinguished Achievement in Costume Design & Technology

Ms. Robbins' work has been featured in more than 30 Broadway shows, including *Class Act*, *Grease* (original), *Agnes of God*, *Yentl*, *Octette Bridge Club*, *Sweet Bird of Youth* (with Lauren Bacall), *Frankenstein*, *Happy End* (with Meryl Streep), *Boys of Winter*, *Cyrano* (with Frank Langella), and *Shadow Box* (with Mercedes Ruehl).




Tony nominations, five Drama Desk, Maharam, USITT/Prague International, L.A. Dramalogue, Henry Hughes, F.I.TSurface Design, and Audelco.

Her costumes for *White Christmas* have been seen in major cities in the United States and Great Britain. Her regional work includes *M. Butterfly* and *On the Verge* for Arena Stage and *American in Paris* for the Alley Theatre, Houston as well as many productions for the Guthrie and Williamstown theatres.

Opera design includes *Death in Venice* for The Glimmerglass Opera ('08 PQ Design Exhibit), *Samson et Dalila* (San Francisco Opera and Houston Grand), and many productions for Sarah Caldwell's Opera Company of Boston. Her work has also been seen at the Hamburg Stats Opera.

Known for her drawing ability, Ms. Robbins' work is featured in the Time-Life Series –Collectibles. She has been profiled in *Costume Design: Techniques of*



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Modern Masters, Contemporary Designers, and CUNY-TV's Women in Theatre series.

She is an MFA graduate from the Yale School of Drama and was master teacher of costume design at the NYU Tisch School of the Arts for many years.

Distinguished Achievement in Management

Mr. Byrnes is the associate provost and dean of graduate studies at Southern Utah University where he served as dean of the College of Performing and Visual Arts from 2004 to 2009. He teaches graduate seminars in the arts administration program in board relations, strategic planning, fundraising, economics, financial management, and leadership. His textbook, *Management and the Arts* is widely used in arts and culture management courses throughout the world.

Mr. Byrnes was a professor of theatre and associate dean of Florida State University's School of Theatre from 1994 to 2004. He also directed the MFA Theatre Management program at FSU. Before that, he worked for 22 years as a faculty member and administrator at Oberlin College in Oberlin, Ohio. He began his career as a lighting designer, technical director, and production manager. He has designed the lighting for over 150 productions.

He is on the advisory board of ISW Business School in Freiburg, Germany where he has been a guest lecturer since 2003. He has lectured on arts management in China, Japan, Singapore, Turin, Cologne, and Belgrade. He is a member of the Editorial Advisory Committee of the Asia Pacific Journal of Arts and Cultural Management. He was President of USITT in 2000-02 and is a Fellow and a recipient of the Joel E. Rubin Founder's Award. He is editor of "Inside USITT" in TD&T. In 2001, he was inducted into the National Theatre Conference (NTC).

Distinguished Achievement in Education

Mr. Wolf has been a college professor for almost four decades starting in 1972 at the University of Michigan in Ann Arbor. He joined United Scenic Artists in 1977.

In 1982, he moved to Charlottesville, Virginia where he taught at the University of Virginia for two years before crossing the country to teach at California State University from 1984 to 1986. During that time, he joined renowned scenographer Oren Parker in authoring the fifth edition of *Scene Design and Stage Lighting*. Since 1987, Mr. Wolf has been teaching both undergraduate and graduate students at San Diego State University.

He is a full professor of design and head of the design program at San Diego State University. In addition, he is a professional lighting designer whose designs have been seen nationwide, including productions for San Diego's Old Globe Theatre, Dance Theatre Workshop in New York, Virginia Shakespeare and the Richmond Ballet Company, Theatre Artaud in San Francisco, and the Japan America Center and Odyssey Theatre Ensemble of Los Angeles.

He has continued as author of the lighting and sound sections of Scene Design

and Stage Lighting, now in its ninth edition. He has been consistently active with USITT where he has been Lighting Commissioner, Vice-Chair of the Publications Committee, and member of the Board of Directors. Currently, Mr. Wolf is a member of USITT's Awards Committee.

Distinguished Achievement in Technical Production

Mr. Dorn is professor emeritus and former director of theatre at the University of Wisconsin-Madison. He was resident technical director of the University of Wisconsin-Madison from 1976 to 2009 where he served as technical director and designer for over 180 productions. He is an active member and Fellow of USITT, and has been an active contributor to TD&T. He is the co-author of one of the best selling technology books in history and helped to found the highly successful USITT Tech Expo exhibit and catalog. Mr. Dorn was Vice-President for Commissions, and serves at USITT's representative to the ETCP council.

Distinguished Achievement in Architecture

Cesar Pelli, senior principal of Pelli Clarke Pelli Architects, was born in Argentina, where he earned a diploma in architecture from the University of Tucumán. He first worked in the offices of Eero Saarinen, serving as project designer for the TWA Terminal at JFK Airport and Morse and Stiles Colleges at Yale University. He was then director of design at DMJM and, later, partner for design at Gruen Associates, both in Los Angeles. His award-winning projects during these years include the City Hall in San Bernardino, California; the Pacific Design Center in Los Angeles; and the United States Embassy in Tokyo.From 1977 to 1984, Mr. Pelli was dean of the Yale School of Architecture. In 1977, he founded Cesar Pelli & Associates, now Pelli Clarke Pelli Architects.

He has written extensively on architectural issues, including *Observations for Young Architects* (1999). His work has been widely exhibited and is the subject of nine books. He has received 12 honorary degrees and more than 200 awards for design excellence. He is a Fellow of the American Institute of Architects, and a member of the American Academy of Arts and Letters, the National Academy of Design, the International Academy of Architecture, and of l'Academie d'Architecture de France. In 1995, the American Institute of Architects awarded Mr. Pelli the Gold Medal, in recognition of a lifetime of distinguished achievement in architecture. In 2004, he was awarded the Aga Khan Award for Architecture for the design of the Petronas Towers.

Distinguished Achievement in Scene Design

Mr. Scheffler has been an all-category union designer since 1968. He has a degree in architecture from Tulane University and was a junior partner in the Phillip Henry Roach, Jr. architectural firm. He has designed over 300 costumes for various crews of the Mardi Gras in New Orleans. He was the resident designer for the Algiers Community Theatre and two ballet companies in New Orleans.

In 1965, he moved to Brooklyn, New York and has been designing in New York, regional theatre, and opera and summer stock theatre for more than 40 years.



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Remembering Will Bellman



I first met Willard F. Bellman in 1972 at the San Francisco Conference, A number of educators met to discuss USITT's role in establishing standards for higher education, and we formed the Performing Arts Training and **Education Committee with strong** participation by Will. I remember him advising us to examine BFA-type training programs in the Soviet Union and to avoid some of the unintentional consequences created by such job-specific training. I was somewhat overwhelmed by his depth of experience and inspired by his wisdom.

Will, passed away quietly from natural causes in his Winnetka, California home on December 12 at the age of 90. He was preceded in death by his beloved wife, Kay, and is survived by daughter Debbie, son Chris, daughter-in-law Shirley, and two grandchildren.

After receiving a doctorate from Northwestern University, Will began a lifelong career as an educator in theatre design and technology with an emphasis in stage lighting. Beginning in 1950, he taught at University of Wyoming, Washington University, and University of California at Los Angeles. In 1958, he was appointed professor of theatre at California State University Northridge where he served as technical director and lighting designer until retiring in 1988.

Dr. Bellman wrote *Lighting the Stage, Art and Practice*. In its third edition, Dick Devin

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described the book to be one of the few sources to contribute to the training of graduate students in lighting and commented "He was always so approachable, understanding, kind, and wise."

Dr. Bellman also wrote *Scene Design, Stage Lighting, Sound, Costume And Make-up: A Scenographic Approach* and *Scenography And Stage Technology: An Introduction* which broke new ground toward understanding scenography as an all-inclusive concept. Speaking of Will, Richard Durst recalled, "I remain humble in recalling that friendship, knowing that I was often in the presence of someone who had a profound effect on the practice of lighting and stage technology."

David Rodger noted eight articles by Dr. Bellman in *Theatre Design & Technology* including a major publication, "Workloads for Theatre in Higher Education," that has provided critical ammunition for many designers and technicians attempting to mitigate workloads. Joel Rubin remembered, while discussing a draft of Will's prime achievement "Guidelines for Tenure and Promotion," "We need to do this for our profession," and Will responded "Regardless of consequences." That was the relentless Will Bellman that I so fondly remember.

For so many USITT members, their initial encounter with Will was at a Conference. Rick Thomas wrote, "He treated me so generously ... was gracious, and kind, enthused, and charming and acted like he had known me for many years."

Dick Arnold commented, "Will was indeed a great gentleman and a great contributor to our field and to the Institute." He was honored with a Lifetime Membership Award, the Joel E. Rubin Founder's Award, and a Special Citation for Achievement in Lighting Design Education, and was designated a Fellow of USITT.

He was a founding member of the Southern California Regional Section and Randy Davidson noted "wondrous leadership from Will. He always opened doors for me to other professionals."

Dr. Bellman's work on the USITT International Liaison Committee was one of his most significant contributions. He served as the U.S. delegate to a variety of world meetings of the Organisation Internationale des Scenografes, Techniciens et Architects de Theatre (OISTAT). Len Auerbach remembers a trip to Dresden, East Germany in the late 1970s with Will when they traveled through East Berlin to meet colleagues who failed to show. Len tells of a long trip by foot, through dark streets searching for a hotel that, when found, had only one room reserved. Quite a night but Will always enjoyed a challenge. Jay Glerum noted Will's major contribution to the rigging standards project in translating the German DIN standards.

A memorial service is being planned and the family requests any memorial gifts be directed to the USITT Young Designers & Technicians Award in Lighting Design c/o USITT 315 South Crouse Ave., Syracuse, NY 13210.

Tim Kelly said it best, "USITT has been privileged to count in its ranks many legendary figures that shaped the way theatre business is conducted and passed down to the next generations. It's difficult to single out just a few but a seminal trio would certainly include Arnold Gillette, Harold Burris-Meyer, and Will Bellman. What a pleasure it is to have been able to call Will Bellman a friend. We miss our dear friend and know his legacy will continue to inspire new generations of theatre artists and technicians."

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
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Online Marketplace Now Open



New, updated, and e-Easy to navigate! That's the new online marketplace for members at shop.usitt.org. Members can now get to USITT bookstore items via this new shopping site, which has enhanced features.

The e-mail address at which a member receives USITT e-mail is the username and the member number is the password. This allows access to a secure shopping cart for purchases. Credit cards are processed through Authorize.net to add another layer of SSL security.

Rather than flat rate shipping, there are shipping choices -- overnight, ground and everything in between. The site also prepares all shipping documents so there is less chance of an address being misspelled or numbers inverted.

Follow an order as it is processed with an e-mailed receipt and updates as soon as things ship.

Requests for logo clothing and other items which were only carried at the conference are now available at the site year-round.

After a very lengthy and difficult adjudication process, 10 outstanding young designers and technicians were selected from over 72 students nominated for the Awards for Young Designers & Technicians in the Performing Arts. The winners will be honored during the Annual Conference & Stage Expo in Charlotte. North Carolina in March.

- Bona Lee of Yale School of Drama is the winner of the *KM Fabrics, Inc.*Technical Production Award. Bronislaw Sammler nominated Ms. Lee, who is scheduled to graduate in May. Fritz Fritz Schwentker, commented "There is clearly an incredible amount of hard work and study that has gone into becoming such a talented technician."
- Valerie Lawrence will receive the Robert E. Cohen Sound Achievement Award. Charles Hatcher nominated Ms. Lawrence, who is scheduled to graduate in June from the College Conservatory of Music, University of Cincinnati. One adjudicator describes Ms. Lawrence as a "...very exciting"

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new designer, whom I am sure will continue to grow and see much success as she pursues a professional career."

- Mary Ellen Stebbins, winner of the USITT Lighting Design Award sponsored by Barbizon, will be graduating from Boston University in May. Ms. Stebbins was nominated by Roger Meeker. Preview in Charlotte: PQ '11, Scenofest Offer International Perspectives

Once every four years, the theatre design community from around the world joins together to celebrate recent accomplishments in the field with the world's largest exposition for theatre design at the Prague Quadrennial.

PQ '11 will take place June 16 to 26 in the Veletrzni
Palace, the National Museum of Modern Art, and other
locations in the city of Prague. The Veletrzni Palace is a
short walk from the familiar grounds of Vystaviste where
the exhibit has been hosted in the past. Recently damaged
by a fire, the Industrial Palace will not be restored in time
for this year's PQ. The Countries and Regions Exhibit and
the Student Exhibit will both be located in the Veletrzni Palace, while the
Architecture Exhibit is to be housed in Prague Crossroads, a deconsecrated
church.

Sixty-four countries will participate in the PQ this year. The Section of Regions and Countries will feature contemporary productions in a variety of performance design disciplines and genres including multi-media, projection, and digital applications to design for theatre, mapping the latest trends in theatre from around the world. The Extreme Costume Exhibit, new to this year's PQ, will focus on using unconventional materials and silhouettes for costumes.

PQ and Scenofest activities are scheduled to occur around the city in theatres and on the streets. On the piazetta of the National Theatre, the Intersection: Intimacy and Spectacle project will present 30 installations/performances housed in black boxes and white cubes. This series will feature scenographers, fashion designers, photographers, and choreographers from around the globe.

The Disk Theatre at the Academy of Performing Arts (DAMU) will host "Disk Stories," performances from international students and schools, featuring sound and light as the central force for the narrative or concept.

Site specific performances, called Six Acts, will be performed around the streets

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in the heart of Prague. Teams of students from different countries will work with leading artists to create unique performances or installations drawing from their cross-cultural backgrounds and intensive collaboration.

Street Stories, consists of teams of student collaborators bringing 30-minute design as performance events, will be presented in squares in the center of the city. In the tradition of street theatre, these performances must be completely portable and self-contained.

Projection designer Daniel Brodie received the seventh annual USITT Rising Star Award, sponsored by LDI2011 and *Live Design* magazine. It will be presented at the opening night reception Wednesday, March 9 at the 51st Annual Conference & Stage Expo in Charlotte, North Carolina.



Mr. Brodie is a freelance New York-based projection designer and multimedia artist. He was the projection

designer for puppeteer Basil Twist in productions of *Behind the Lid Arias With a Twist*. In 2008 Arias won critical acclaim with a seventh-month run in New York, an international tour, and a rave in *The New York Times*. The production became the subject of *Arias With a Twist: The Docufantasy*, which premiered in February 2010 at the Berlin International Film Festival. Mr. Brodie received recognition for his work with the 19th Annual Ticketholder Award for Best Video Design 2009. On Broadway, he has served as associate or assistant projection designer on *The Pee Wee Herman Show* and *Lombardi* and *Elf: The Musical*. He earned a BA in theater from Arizona State University.

The Rising Star Award recognizes excellence and artistic achievement in the areas of scenic, lighting, sound, and projection design, or the convergence of these design disciplines. The award is given at the beginning of a career to a young designer in the first four years of professional, non-academic work, following the completion of the candidate's highest degree.



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News From **David Grindle**, *USITT Executive Director* Weather Cold and Snowy, But Warmth Surrounds

BRRRRR!!!!

There; that's the basic answer to how my family and I are holding up in our first winter in Central New York. In preparation for the Charlotte 2011 Conference & Stage Expo -- registering for the conference, booking hotel and flight reservations, planning what sessions to attend and which booths to visit first -- consider joining the Lighting Design & Technology Commission's portfolio review as either a presenter or reviewer.

One aspect of the Lighting Commission's mission is to promote excellence in lighting design and lighting design education. Portfolio reviews allow presenters a wider audience for their progress and work by getting opinions from someone other than a primary mentor. Reviewers have an opportunity to see upcoming talent happening across the country along with sharing their knowledge and skills by giving comments or suggesting improvements to the presenter's work or presentation style in a manner helpful yet non-threatening.

The overall review process takes approximately 30 minutes for each review and is a constructive way to participate in Commission-sponsored activities. Anyone with a degree in lighting, who is currently working in the professional field and interested in having a hand sculpting upcoming lighting designers should consider becoming a reviewer. Beginning reviewers will be teamed with those who have reviewed during prior conferences.

Presenters are made up of students at all levels, professionals just starting out or looking for the next step up, and educators needing a peer review for the promotion and tenure process.

An exhibition of scenery and costume designs by John C. Scheffler is being

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created by the Scene Design Commission, Mr. Scheffler has been an all-category union designer since 1968. He has a degree in architecture from Tulane University and was a junior partner in the Phillip Henry Roach Jr. Architectural Firm. He has designed over 300 costumes for various crews of the Mardi Gras in New Orleans. He was the resident designer for the Algiers Community Theatre and two ballet companies in New Orleans. In 1965 he moved to Brooklyn, New York and has been designing in New York, regional theatre, opera, and summer stock theatre for more than 40 years. In 1970-71 he won an OBIE Award for his set design for AC-DC, and in

1977-78 the Carbonell Award for best set for his production of *Violano Virtuoso* and an ADELCO nomination. He was head of the theatre design program at Brooklyn College for 24 years. Now retired, he is still designing sets and costumes for theatres in Brooklyn and in Manhattan. The exhibition will include both set and costume designs.

The costumes are from 40 years of association with the Mardi Gras. Several of the actual Mardi Gras costumes will be on exhibition in Charlotte. His set design work is from regional and New York work. Even a quick glance at his impressive resume indicates an accomplished and gifted theater artist with design credits from the Santa Fe Opera; Aspen Music Festival; The Gray Wig – Hofstra Alumni, Hofstra University; Compass Theater, New York City; La Mama, New York City; Houston Grand Opera; American Opera Theatre; Julliard School of Music; San Francisco Opera; Opera Theatre of St. Louis; The Academy of Vocal Arts, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania; Oberlin Opera Theatre, Oberlin, Ohio; University of Texas, Austin, Texas; Eastman School of Music, Rochester, New York; Florida State University,


Opera Department; and National Opera of Chile, Santiago, Chile. Many of the companies that John has designed for have had him return to

Jesse Dreikosen will organize "Alternative Avenues" Design Beyond the Theater presented by the Scene Design Commission. This exhibit will showcase professional design work by scene designers outside traditional theatre in hopes to expand the horizons for the next generation of designers and possibly inspire current professionals to broaden their perspective. Ten designers' work will be on display showcasing examples that range from theme park design to mural painting and from museum installations to interior design. On Friday 2:45 to 4 p.m. Training for the New Design Era: Sustainable Careers in Design, will be an exploration, through discussion and audience participation, of how to train for the job that does not exist and finding ways to integrate "Alternative Avenues" into training the next generation of designers.'

To Feature Costume Collections

The Costume Design & Technology Commission also is creating two exhibitions for the Charlotte conference: the *Magic of Hollywood: the Gene London Costume Collection* and *Too Much is Not Enough: Exploring Harriett Lake's Closet.*

The Magic of Hollywood collection was assembled by Philadelphia-area TV personality and fashion designer Gene London. He hosted a popular daily children's show seen on WCAU-TV from 1958-1977. On his award-winning Cartoon Corner General Store, he was producer, director, writer, and star drawing upon his many talents and charismatic personality to create a magical environment where he told stories, myths, and folkloreillustrating them on his drawing board. Famous stars such as Kirk Douglas, Lucille Ball, Myrna Loy, and

Mary Tyler Moore would often appear on the show.

It was Joan Crawford who started Mr. London's amazing collection by sending him articles from her stage and personal wardrobes. After Cartoon Corners went off the air, Mr. London moved to New York City. Until 2001, he operated a retro clothes shop, and in later years, served as a Hollywood and Broadway fashion consultant and spokesman for the Mikimoto brand of jewelry.

He collected costumes worn by movie celebrities (some 60,000 gowns, dresses and fashion accessories). In July 2002, at age 71, he exhibited more than 50 pieces of his Hollywood gown collection at Gene London Presents: Hollywood Glamour at the Showboat Casino Hotel in Atlantic City. On May 17, 2003, he once again displayed his gowns at the 80th anniversary celebration of the Old Academy Players in Philadelphia. The exhibit included a deep red dress with plunging neckline and fur-trimmed sleeves worn by Philadelphia-bred actress Grace Kelly in the Oscar-winning film *The Country* Girl (1954). On October 3, 2009 the Reading Public Museum, Reading, Pennsylvania, opened The Magic of Hollywood: The Gene London Costume Collection," featuring more than 100 gowns and costumes. Sean Connery's warrior outfit from Robin and Marian, Tyronne Power's matador costume from Blood and Sand, and Fredric March's jeweled tunic costume from the Affairs of Cellini are among the many extraordinary men's costumes that are a unique feature of the full collection. Michael Jackson's prince outfit, worn for a 1985 photo shoot, is also in the full collection.

The complete exhibition features over 130 costumes created by film industry's greatest designers.

Too Much is Not Enough: Exploring Harriett's Closet offers a unique perspective of how a clothing collection reflects the personality and viewpoint of its owner. Harriet's clothing style is extravagant, and her collection is in many ways extreme. She unapologetically purchases any piece of clothing she desires. This exhibit allows the viewer to experience the unique style of this woman through the beauty and historical significance of her wardrobe's contents. The garments chosen for the exhibit are a cross-section of her wardrobe from post WWII to present day. The garments vary from well known designers such as Coco Chanel and Andrienne Landau, to clothing recently purchased from Target. The exhibit also integrates photographs of additional pieces, personal photographs of Ms. Lake and life size images of her closet.



The day she was discharged from the Marines, Harriet Lake swore to buy something that was pictured in Vogue—and she did. The navy and plaid jacket with the coordinating skirt became her Victory Suit, both in celebration of the end of the war and of her fashion.independence. It marks the beginning of her closet and has been joined by thousands of other personally and historically significant garments.



In her younger days, Ms. Lake would buy clothes from consignment shops often knowing the original wearer. The "wheat dress" was such a buy as it originally belonged to the daughter of the local grocery store mogul. To this day, despite having the wealth to buy anything she wants, she prides herself on outlet shopping.

Be sure to plan plenty of time to stroll all the Special Exhibits being presented at Stage Expo during the 2011 Conference & Stage Expo in Charlotte.

Experience the Arts in Charlotte

The Charlotte area hosts several major local professional performance groups. Three notable ones are Opera Carolina, North Carolina Dance Theatre, and The Charlotte Symphony Orchestra. Each is an important fixture in the performing arts landscape of the Charlotte metropolitan area.

Opera Carolina performs three productions a year in the Belk Theater at the Blumenthal Performing Arts Center. This year, the season began with Mozart's Cosí Fan Tutte in October and continues with La Traviata in February, finishing with HMS Pinafore in May. Opera Carolina was created in 1948 as Charlotte Music Club with volunteers and an operating budget of \$125. It has since grown to an operating budget of \$3 million, and is the largest professional opera in the Carolinas. Opera Carolina's website features far more information about the organization and ticket purchasing information. James Meena is the general



director and principal conductor.

North Carolina Dance Theatre was founded in 1970 and has grown to be North Carolina's largest professional ballet company. It has a new facility at 701 North Tryon Street and performs regularly at the Knight and Belk Theaters in the Blumenthal Performing Arts Center. It has an operating budget of over \$4 million and employs 22 professional dancers. North Carolina Dance Theatre is producing seven major productions this season. It includes its 40th Anniversary Performance at 7:30 p.m. Thursday, March 10 through Saturday, March 12 at the Knight Theater while the Annual Conference & Stage Expo is in session. *The Little Mermaid* will also be performed at 2 p.m. Saturday, March 12 and Sunday, March 13 at the Knight Theater. Tickets can be purchased from the site or through the Blumenthal Performing Arts Center. Jean-Pierre Bonnefoux and Patricia McBride serve as artistic directors.

The Charlotte Symphony Orchestra was founded in 1932 and currently produces 100 performances a year, mostly in the Belk Theater. Charlotte Symphony Orchestra employs 100 professional musicians with 62 on full-time contracts. The operating budget is \$7.8 million a year. Charlotte Symphony Orchestra also serves as the resident orchestra for North Carolina Dance Theatre and Opera Carolina. During Friday, March 11 and Saturday, March 12 the symphony will perform selections of Wagner and Bruckner conducted by Christof Perick at the Belk Theater. Tickets can be purchased through they symphony's website or through the Blumenthal Performing Arts Center. Christopher Warren-Green serves as the musical director.

Each of these organizations features high artistic and production quality and value. They are worth checking out if one is interested in the Charlotte area performing arts, each being the area's premier organization of each respective craft. Tickets to any of the events listed during USITT's conference can be purchased through the Blumenthal Performing Arts Center or by calling them at 704-372-1000 Monday through Saturday 10 a.m. to 6 p.m.


