2011 Architecture Winners Named



Arena Stage at the Mead Center for American Theatre will receive the only Honor Award to be given as part of the 2011 USITT Architecture Awards program. Four outstanding new or renovated performance spaces will receive Merit Awards as part of the recognition program.

Arena Stage at the Mead Center for American Theatre, in Washington, DC opened in October after more than 10 years of planning and more than two years of construction. It has been widely acclaimed.







Prepare PQ Exhibits for Travel

Exactly five months before the gala opening of the 2011 Prague Quadrennial on June 15, members of the USITT-USA Exhibits Committee assembled in Missoula, Montana for the trial set ups of the three exhibits planned for the PQ. Hosting the event were Mike Monsos and Alessia Carpoca, University of Montana Missoula faculty members from the School of Theatre & Dance, and their team of nine students. The Montana group has been working on the construction of the three exhibits since August and were ready to show their almost-completed work to the rest of the team.

The National Exhibit is an evocation of the garage and found space-style theatre buildings where many of the judged companies perform. Designed by Bill Bloodgood, the walls of the exhibit emulate bricks. The students cut over 15,000 blocks of wood and applied them to the facade and

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interior of the structure to create the brick texture. Led by Ms. Carpoca, they next painted the exterior walls, first to heighten the brick effect, and then to deface it with graffiti. The iconic poster image of President Obama is prominently located on one wall so that it will be one of the first things visitors see when they come to the exhibit.

The finished construction was practically camouflaged in the scene shop, sharing the same paint colors and spattered textures of the surrounding walls and floors. When the exhibit is remounted in the smooth marble modernist environment of the Velerzni Palace, the location of the exhibition in Prague, the contrast will be striking.

Artistic director Susan Tsu, and curators Chris Barreca and Linda Cho, spent much of their time in Missoula determining the location for each of the 37 productions in the exhibit. In addition to being mounted on the walls, pieces are placed on ladders, sawhorses, bulletin boards, and other makeshift frameworks reflective of the workshop environment. Display artifacts include models, digital frames, and large-scale photographic cutouts as well as props and costumes. Assistant Designer Eric Stone was occupied most of the week meticulously mounting the photos and labels on foamboard.

In addition to exhibit arrangement, there was a trial run of the widescreen projections designed by Jason Lindhal, which will present clips from multi-media productions, as well as interviews with many of the artists included in the exhibit. The effect is made possible by a generous donation from TMB and Green Hippo, who are providing the projection equipment for the showings in Prague and at the 2012 USITT Conference & Stage Expo in Long Beach, California.

Lighting equipment came from Seachanger and ETC, and the exhibit lighting is designed by Allen Hahn. Sound apparatus was shipped in from d+b audiotechnik and Sennheisser and designed by Don Tindall. Paul Brunner from Indiana University in Bloomington was present since he, his shop, and students have been chosen to construct the USITT PQ USA 2015 exhibits. USITT

Executive Director David Grindle participated in the process and remarked that is it quite likely this is the only exhibit in the Section of Regions and Countries built entirely by students, one of the hallmarks of the culture of USITT.

The Student Exhibit, Emerge, was also set up for Rachelle Beckermann and Collin Ranney, members of the student committee to refine. The curated portion of their exhibit will be presented in digital frames, and the second focus will be on American students who come to Prague to create designs within the space during the exhibition hours. Teams of two students from different schools will be given a phrase of poetry and 90 minutes to design their response to it, using found objects and art supplies provided. All their new works will be added to the display for an ever-changing exhibit. There are still time slots available for students wanting to participate in this part of the exhibit. Their mentor, Tom Burch, was also in attendance to work out the details of the participatory aspect of the exhibit. For more information on participating, go to www.pgusastudent.com.

The Architecture Exhibit will feature eight projects and have glimpses of dozens of other buildings to demonstrate the vast number of theatres being developed in America. Two plexiglass towers will house mini-projectors showing time-lapse videos of the construction process. The architecture exhibits from each country are built to fit on a table, and charged with contributing to the discussion, "What will you bring to the table?"

All USITT members are welcome and encouraged to travel to Prague to partake in this most expansive and significant recognition of the contribution of design to the profession of theatre. In addition to the exhibit, there will be performances from across the globe, seminars and workshops, and the Scenofest of activities for students. Everyone who has ever attended a PQ event has invariably said that the experience has changed their lives.

For more information about the events connected with PQ 2011, there are two sessions scheduled during the USITT Annual Conference in Charlotte. Sodja Lotker, Artistic Director of the PQ, will present the plans for this year's exposition on Wednesday, March 9 at 4:15. Thursday, March 10 at 5:30, Jessica Bowles and James McKernan will introduce the range of activities for the Scenofest.

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The Last Word:

Creating The Marna King Theater Collection

Marna King reflects on her experiences collecting images and impressions in the late twentieth century which now form the basis of The Marna King Theater Collection.

Members who attended USITT Annual Conferences between the years 1984 to 1991 may have attended sessions in which I reported on plays I had seen in Germany that used the associational theatre aesthetic then prevalent in prominent West German state and city theatres. These eye witness accounts were accompanied by slides of photographs taken by the theatre photographer of each particular play. The presentation was a walk-through of each production demonstrating the strategies and techniques used to communicate to the audience. Every element of the production – script, actor, staging, and the production's individual designers – had a separate voice in this collaged, montaged format.






From 1981 through 2000, I witnessed, studied, and collected primary materials of each production I thought valuable to record – 155 such files from the former Federal Republic of Germany and 85 files from the former East Germany after the fall of the Berlin Wall from 1990-2000. I used this material to influence my own costume designs and those of my students, and to reach American theatre practitioners through presentations and articles. When I retired in 2002, I converted my working files into the Marna King Theater Collection which I donated in 2006 to the Akademie der Künste in Berlin. The collection resides in its Arkiv Darstellende Kunst [Performing Arts]. It has recently been made available to anyone wishing to view or work with its contents.

What types of plays can be found in the collection? German theatre artists and audiences have a keen interest in plays that span all ages and all countries. For the most part, I selected dramas which American theatre professionals and students might know or could easily reference.

Would the collection be of value to scholars and theatre practitioners who know little or no German? Yes, the collection is easily accessible to those not fluent in German. The I.D cards, which record the type and amount of material included in each file, are in English as well as observations, comments, notations, and informal interviews. The more than 1,000 photos taken by theatre photographers during final rehearsals speak for themselves.

I've identified each photo by play, scene/act, and character. In addition, I've included selected writings of my own which contain copies of the photos used to illustrate them. Be prepared to stay a while. The collection weighed over 400 pounds when shipped to the Akademie. Also included in the collection are 215 files from West Germany for the years 1968-1980 that I researched to better understand the origins of this aesthetic movement.

A more formal announcement will be distributed during the Charlotte 2011 Conference & Stage Expo at the Costume Design & Technology and Scene Design & Technology Commission meetings and at the general information table in the PQ Exhibition Hall. It will contain information about how to contact the Akademie der Künste archive and the website which will contain the annotated Table of Contents for the collection.

Lighting Archive Receives Major Gift

The Penn State Lighting Archive has received a major gift from David L. Thayer, emeritus professor of design, University of Iowa. Professor Thayer has donated his entire collection of historic lighting fixtures, dimmers, and control boards to Penn State's Theatre Lighting Archive. There are more than 75 distinct pieces,





consisting primarily of early incandescent fixtures and arc fixtures. Due to space concerns following the severe flood that the University of Iowa suffered in 2008, Professor Thayer decided to seek out a home for all his equipment. Penn State has been building a significant collection of theatre lighting history over the past several decades, which includes several hundred fixtures, dimmers, and control boards, along with thousands of drawings, period gel books, catalogs, and other accessories. William Kenyon, associate professor of design, will catalog the new gift over the next several months. In Memoriam, Theoni V. Aldredge

USITT notes the death of Theoni V. Aldredge, costume designer, who died in January in Stamford, Connecticut. She was 88. Ms. Aldredge designed the costumes for hundreds of Broadway and Off Broadway productions including *Annie*, *A Chorus Line*, and *La Cage aux Folles*, and won an Academy Award for her work on "The Great Gatsby."

She is survived by her husband, actor Tom Aldredge. She won three Tony Awards for costume design, for *Annie*, *Barnum*, and *La Cage aux Folles*. Her many film credits included *Network*, *Semi-Tough*, *Moonstruck*, *Ghostbusters*. and *Addams Family Values*.

She has designed for Lincoln Center Rep, Chelsea Theatre Center, New York Shakespeare Festival, Arena Stage, Glimmerglass, the Mark Taper Forum, and The Guthrie. Other designs have been for San Francisco Opera, Houston Grand Opera, Hamburg Statsoper, and others. Film and television credits include *In the Spirit* and *Saturday Night Live*.

She has received two Tony nominations and five Drama Desk awards. She also designed uniforms for the Rainbow Room and Windows on the World restaurants. Her rendering expertise covers both traditional and digital forms. She recently curated the Lincoln Center Library exhibit *Curtain Call*, which featured the design work of women in theatre.

Along with Ms. Robbins, the Review Committee will schedule sessions for any designer seeking feedback and advice on how to develop, improve, and present a portfolio. The committee is comprised of working artists and educators. The reviews are open to designers, technicians, crafts artisans, hair and make-up artists, and any practitioner combining those fields.

Past committee chairman Rafael Jaén suggests five guidelines to presenting work:

- Pay attention to grooming and use professional manners.
- Have a plan, use clear voice articulation, and listen carefully to feedback. Clear labeling, captions, and keys will help guide the viewer.
- Have a beginning, middle, and end. Plan transitions between projects. Include visuals that explain the scope of the project.

- Have brief concept statements, and use proper garment names and period references. Include important research materials. Be current with the show information and dramaturgy.
- Feature different theatrical styles and historical periods. Include different sketching styles. Make sure the page layout and use of captions are impeccably designed.

A digital portfolio also should be "designed." To have a digital format portfolio reviewed, bring a laptop with the portfolio ready to be viewed.

Portfolio Reviews at the USITT Annual Conference & Stage Expo are valuable sessions that can assist designers and technicians. This year, Esther Van Eek and Steven Stines begin as co-chairs for the reviews. The commission highly encourages all participants to share in the excitement of these sessions. Volunteering as a reviewer can be inspiring and helpful to both the interviewee and the mentor. Having the courage to get a critique from professionals in the field can be of great value for the young designer or technician in building self-confidence and charting their next steps.

A Theatre Waiting for Rebirth

The Carolina Theatre will be the subject of a special Adaptive Reuse Design Charette session from 9:30 to 11 p.m. Friday, March 11 as part of the 2011 Annual Conference. The session is being organized by the Architecture Commission and will include work with architects, theatre consultants, and acousticians to develop a program, business plan, and a design. The session involves drawing and sharing of ideas, followed by presentations of the strategies.

If you stand on the corner of 6th and Tryon Streets in the very heart of downtown Charlotte, North Carolina you'll see it. It won't look like much, just a rectangular brick building, clay red with an unlit neon sign and some street level windows displaying toppled, moldy posters. You think that the tall section in the back might be a fly loft, and that door on the Sixth street side, chained and barred, certainly reminds you of some stage doors you've had the privilege to loiter by. The giveaway is on the side of the building facing Tryon Street: a poster with a fancy illustration of a condo development with a marquee. "Carolina Theatre," it says. "The best is yet to come!"

At one time, the building was one of the community's best-loved

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entertainment options opening in 1927 to record crowds. The design was a joint effort between C. C. Hook, preeminent Charlotte architect, and R. E. Hall, famed New York theatre designer. Mr. Hook styled the exterior of the theatre to mimic three separate storefronts done in the Spanish Renaissance style with a brilliantly lit marquee. The storefronts led into a luxurious lobby, all gilt and palatial Venetian. The theatre itself was ornately columned displaying stunning murals of dark cypress trees and flowering vines that evoked a Mediterranean palazzo under the azure blue sky darkening just before dusk.

It was the first commercial building in town with air conditioning, and folks came from all over to enjoy its luxury. The 1,450-seat theatre offered a respite from the hot Southern air and an escape into fiction six nights a week. All the best Hollywood features played there. The Sound of Music played a record 79-week run attracting more audience members than lived in the county. Most weekends, the local vaudeville company would put on a show and road shows kept the audiences coming back to see talents like Elvis Presley, Bob Hope, Orson Welles, and Ethel Barrymore. The Carolina became the first racially integrated theatre in the region.

The Carolina reigned over the Queen City for many decades. Over the

years, modifications were made and parts of the original architecture and decor were lost to upgrades in the technological systems of the theatre. Then slowly, things began to change. Middle class families began to flee to the suburbs, spent less time Uptown. In 1972 the theatre almost closed but Kermit High, the manager for many years, stepped in and took ownership. Even he had to let it go in 1978, and it has been vacant ever since.

In 1980, vagrants set a fire in the back of the building, destroying the original

stage but leaving the structure intact. In 1988 the lobby was torn down leaving only the theatre and the façade standing. The façade, which was briefly on the Local Historical Register and then taken off to accommodate "progress," was carefully taken down and put inside the theatre so it could be put back in place when the theatre is restored. It was about to fall down by itself, so the city paid to take it down. All that remains in its place is asphalt black top surrounded by a chain link.

For 33 years the theatre has sat empty. As it languished, other theatres were born. The North Carolina Blumenthal Performing Arts Center has an outstanding facility with three theatres on Tryon Street, built in 1992. The Children's Theatre of Charlotte moved to a brand new, state-of-the art facility on 7th Street in 2005. And just a short time ago, the Blumenthal added another facility to its collection; the Knight Theater, that seats 1,150 just a few short blocks down Tryon Street from the Carolina.

Many attempts to use the Carolina Theatre in some capacity have been made. The Carolina was almost torn down to be a bank; almost restored to be a restaurant or a nightclub, and in 1999 was almost a performing arts center. The Carolina Theatre Preservation Society, founded in 1997 by local businessman Charlie Clayton, has been trying to save the theatre for almost 14 years. They were close a few years ago with the Encore Project, a condo development that would have been attached to the theatre and financed its restoration, except the economy tanked and the project stalled. Funding, developers, and projects have all come and gone.

Charlotte, the nation's second largest banking center, has struggled to define itself often destroying its past. The Carolina sits and waits for action. Take a moment while in Charlotte to stand at the corner of 6th and Tryon and look upon the shell of the Carolina. 

Theatre Charlotte Still Going Strong

Still going strong, Theatre Charlotte has been a vibrant presence in the community for more than eight decades. Although it will not be presenting during the USITT Annual Conference & Stage Expo, Theatre Charlotte is in its 83rd season, making it the oldest arts organization in the city and



the longest, continually producing theatre in North Carolina.

In 1927, the Charlotte branch of the American Association of University Women decided to study the Little Theatre movement, the grassroots effort to mount amateur theatricals that swept the country during and after World War I. After performing at various venues and performance halls for nearly two decades, the Little Theatre of Charlotte settled into its current home on Queens Road in Myers Park. In 1941, the building was completed (previously the land had been a cemetery), and the first production, *George Washington Slept Here*, closed on December 6, 1941. Since that time, despite several wars, the Great Depression, 9/11, and even a major hurricane, Theatre Charlotte has always produced a season of theatre.

Theatre Charlotte brings quality productions to the stage and relies heavily on volunteers. It takes hundreds of volunteers, from actors and technicians, to carpenters, ushers and box office personnel, to mount any production. Theatre Charlotte has won numerous MTA and AACT awards and is the only three time winner of Community Theatre of the Year from NCTC. Theatre Charlotte's mission as a volunteer-based community theatre is to create outstanding theatre opportunities relevant to the people of the Charlotte region.
