Registration is now open for CITT's Rendez-vous 2011, the organization's 21th Annual Conference & Trade Show in Victoria, British Columbia, Canada, from August 11 to 13.

CITT, the Canadian Institute for Theatre Technology, holds its conference over three days - from Thursday to Saturday - and offers full days of seminars and social events, with more intense certification courses and workshops held two days prior to the main event. An industry trade show features CITT corporate members presenting new products and technologies.

Applying for Tenure? Need Guidance?

Anyone who is part of the tenure process would benefit from USITT's first tenure preparation workshop, which will be held in conjunction with the Educational Theatre Association's conference in Chicago, Illinois September 23 and 24.

Session include how to express work as research to non-theatre faculty reviewers with breakouts for research universities and for liberal arts schools; preparing to submit proposals to publishers; finding appropriate outside reviewers and available resources; and individual dossier reviews.

Draft Powered Rigging Standards in Public Review

Two of the several documents that make up the E1.6 project for powered rigging systems in the entertainment industry are available for public review on the PLASA website.

BSR E1.6-1 - 201x, Entertainment Technology – Powered Hoist Systems, deals with powered winches that are not serially manufactured electric chain hoists. These are most often wire rope winches that are installed as part of a powered rigging system. The document is intended to establish requirements for the design, manufacture, inspection, and maintenance of

- powered hoist systems for lifting and suspending loads in theatres and other places of public assembly. It is in public review through July 11.
- BSR E1.6-4 201x, Portable Control of Fixed-Speed Electric Chain Hoists in the Entertainment Industry, covers portable control systems for singlespeed electric chain hoists. These systems are most often used to control one or more chain hoists being used to fly equipment or scenery in shows or events being done in arenas and convention centers. It was in public review through June 27.

Updating the NEC

USITT's Engineering Commission is preparing proposals for changes to the National Electrical Code(r) (NEC(r)) for the 2014 edition.

The 2011 edition of the National Electrical Code has been available since last fall. It is time to start the tri-annual process leading to the creation of the 2014 edition. The NEC revision process begins by the general public (you) submitting proposals to revise the Code. These proposals are due on November 4, 2011. In January 2012, the various Code Panels meet to consider these proposals and comment on them. These comments are published in the spring and are available to the public. The general public has until October 17, 2012, to comment on the Code Panels' decisions. The Code Panels meet again in November/December 2012 to consider these public comments. These decisions are published in a Report on Comments.

All proposed changes agreed on by the panels are then voted on by the membership of the National Fire Protection Association at their annual meeting in June, 2013. The new 2014 edition of the NEC will become available in the fall of 2013.

To become involved, make suggestions by writing your proposed changes on copies of the Form for Proposals for 2014 National Electrical Code available in the back of the 2011 NEC, or download the form from www.nfpa.org. In the upper left click on Codes and Standards. In the right center click on NEC Proposal form. Make sure you specify the exact wording change you propose and that you substantiate your proposal based on technical reasoning. There is an example in the back of the 2011 NEC.

To submit proposed changes directly to the NFPA, send them to the address on the proposal form to be received at the NFPA headquarters by 5:00 p.m. EST on November 4, 2011.

July 15 Deadline for USITT Awards

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Pattern Archive Grows with Major **Donations**

Donations continue to enrich the Commercial Pattern Archive. This year, USITT member Linda Sarver began transferring her sizeable pattern collection as well as pattern catalogs, fashion magazines, and other related materials to the Archive. Commission members have been scrambling ever since to get the catalogs and designs digitized and finished that task a couple of weeks ago. The patterns are now in the Pattern Database, CoPA. The count in the database at this point is about 50,000 pattern records dating from the 1860s to 2009.


Another special donation came from a private collector, Elizabeth Brown. Her donation included three McCalls small scale display figures, referred to as "Minikins." The donation included many 1960s outfits for the figures. A master seamstress who is a regular volunteer in the Archive has also made several garments for the figures by scaling down patterns to fit. The outfits included dresses from the 1930s, nurse's uniforms, and a Hoover Apron. Example of the Minikins and some of the outfits can be seen under exhibits at

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The Last Word: A Swan Song

Reflections by Kim Williamson outgoing Vice-President for Commissions

A short while back, I was queried by Barbara Ellen Lucas about my interest in writing an article for *Sightlines* which might reflect upon the six years I have had the privilege and pleasure of serving USITT as VP for Commissions. I pondered where to begin in describing what my role has been over six years of the most exciting, inspiring, and challenging changes for USITT; how the Commissions have moved forward to offer the membership opportunities to investigate the disciplines of our craft; and how the collective work of the Commissioners, Board of Directors, Officers, and USITT Staff has delighted, inspired, and humbled me.

To get a perspective on what began six years ago, I referred to the first article I authored for *Sightlines* as a newly elected VP. Barbara Ellen had interviewed me and asked about what I envisioned as the future of the Commissions of USITT. Not intending to be flip, I cited one of my favorite analogies of the perfect ham and egg breakfast...the chicken is involved, but the pig is *really* committed! I continued "...this is, I believe, the future of the Commissions: the perfect combination of people who are both involved and committed and the structure to help make their ideas happen." If the remarkable accomplishments of the Commissions can be over-simplified, their collective successes are evidence of

what I envisioned six years ago; if you give dedicated people the resources they need to implement their great ideas, they will go above and beyond.

From the first Commissioners Retreat that was held following my election in 2005 to the Commissioners III Meeting in Charlotte in March, the list of what the Commissions initiated, envisioned, and developed has been remarkable by every measure. The Vice-Commissioners for Programming continue to raise the bar on the quality of the work that is inherent to programming; the Commissioners Manual is a working document which continues to evolve as a tool for the Commissioners; the YD&T award nominations have seen an increase of nearly 100% over five years due in part to developing the online submission process and the identification of adjudicators through the commissions.

Programming is and continues to be the heart of the work of the Commissions and their constituents. However, the allocations from the Commissioners Fund, under the recommendations of the Commissioners Steering Committee, brought some of the most innovative and long-lasting projects to USITT.

- Scene Design Commission: 5D Immersive Design Initiative
- Technical Production Commission: Destructive Testing Rig for Stage Rigging Hardware
- Health & Safety Commission: OSHA Training Certification course
- Costume Commission: Database Development for Costume Storage Solutions
- Architecture Commission: AIA/CELU Certification
- Architecture Commission: The Student Architecture Competition-The Ideal Theatre

In the challenging moments to what USITT's future could become, the Commissions engaged fully in the implementation of the bridge model. Among the many opportunities were those developed by connecting the Management Commission with LORT and the Health & Safety Commission with OSHA. The Education Commission, in conjunction with EdTA, presented the first Professional Development Institute for High School Instructors at the 2009 Cincinnati Conference & Stage Expo. The sessions provided Continuing Education credits certified by the American Council on Education and forged a much-needed link between the Institute and our colleagues in high schools across the country.

No reflection on the six years as VP would be complete without a few musings on some of the more individual moments:

- The annual summer visit to the national office Syracuse, ostensibly to "plan" which was merely a clever disguise to chow down at Dinosaur Barbecue!
- Photo ops with Houston's giant armadillo and Cincinnati's Candy Bar Car.

- Pat Dennis' Roberta's Rules as an oft-needed and much appreciated moment of levity during the board meetings.
- My frequent visits to the conference office to chat with Monica Weinzapfel about our "four-legged babies" a.k.a. our horses that we both held as being far more important than any Conference details of the moment!

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The Last Word:

Bringing the Theatre Technology World Together

I didn't intend to be USITT's Vice President for International Activities. The job didn't exist when Dick Durst asked me to run for the Chair of the International Committee. Taking on the responsibility of a committee seemed reasonable enough, but that simple "yes," like so many in our lives, utterly transformed me, and, if I did my job right, USITT, as well.

Since taking this position, I have been able to travel extensively to interact with our colleagues overseas and collect fascinating and unique memories. I attended a meeting of the OISTAT Costume Working Group in Belgium, held at the "Dark Nights," the incomparable 16th century home of Jerome and Christa Maeckelbergh. This small core of dedicated members meets annually for creative workshops based on local resources and culture.

I was invited to be a workshop leader in the first OISTAT workshop, "From Ritual to Theatre," an exploration of the Taiwanese Ghost Festival. Teams of professionals and students created theatrical responses to their impressions of the local ceremonies. On this occasion, I saw the Hakka Holy Boar competition where the splayed skins of their largest boars are displayed like large drums, and I appeared onstage for the first time since freshman year, though completely concealed within a gigantic goddess paper puppet of my own design.

The following year, I traveled to Korea for their ritual workshop, this time making my own necklace of Buddhist prayer beads, kneeling and bowing prostrate as each one was added to the string. Our design team launched little plates of good wishes in a fountain, only to watch them sink from abundance.

I joined Dick Durst on his final USITT Study Tour to Egypt. Seeing the pyramids and cruising the Nile with USITT friends was unforgettable, as was the tour of the scene shop of the opera house where we discovered six inches of sawdust on the floor. A personal highlight was a nostalgic pilgrimage to my childhood home in Maadi, a suburb of Cairo, where I had lived with my family when I was three years old. As with USITT, the greatest value of these adventures was interacting with like-minded colleagues while extending the edges of learning, yet with the added advantage of going beyond national boundaries.

While the impact of these travels on my personal journey was significant, my principal aim was to raise the visibility of international activities for our membership and our global counterparts. In nine years, with support from Treva Reimer, we have increased our conference

programming to fill the matrix and linked our international guests with the Costume, Scene Design, Sound, Technology, and Management Commissions to augment awareness of international theatre across the Institute. Regular

programming now includes International Resources and Opportunities, hosted by Karen Glass, where USITT members present their overseas research and teaching experiences, and a session for OISTAT representatives to share the news of their Commissions and international workshops held in conjunction with their meetings.

We recently prepared our inaugural Professional Development Workshop. Participants were delighted with our leaders, Hakan Dundar and Ali Meric, for their enthusiasm and generosity about Turkish shadow puppetry. With careful management of the Samuel H. Scripps International Fund, we have instituted three travel grants -- one for members and one for students -- and a recently established a grant to bring international guests to the United States for workshops in colleges and universities. Study Tours guided by Dick Durst have shepherded members to Hungary and Romania, Southeast Asia, Greece, Croatia, Serbia and Montenegro, Egypt and Jordan, and, of course, Prague, Czech Republic.

We launched the World Stage Design in Toronto, Canada in 2005, guided by Eric Fielding, and sent many of our members to the subsequent edition in Seoul, Korea in 2009. Our delegates to OISTAT, including Laura Crow, Rick Thomas, and Leon Brauner, have traveled the world bridging with our counterparts in a myriad of countries. In return, we have hosted the World Congress in 2005 and Commission meetings biennially. Michael Ramsaur spent a term as OISTAT President and remains on the Executive Committee.

By far the greatest involvement for me has been the honor of serving as the Commissioner and USITT-International Liaison for our representations in the National, Student, and Architecture Exhibits at the Prague Quadrennial. In 2003, Bob Scales and his students from USC built the exhibit designed by Bob Schmidt and Ursula Belden. In 2007, Tom Korder and his student team from University of Illinois, Urbana-Champaign, constructed the exhibit designed by Nic Ularu and Madeleine Sobota, Mike Monsos and the students of The University of Montana, led by Artistic Director Susan Tsu and designer Bill Bloodgood, assembled the current edition for 2011.

With support from the Tobin Fund for Theatre Arts, we have enhanced our student presence in the PQ exhibits, designed by Tim Saternow in 2003, Ursula Belden in 2007, and a team of students for 2011. American Architecture, previously not shown in Prague, has been represented in each of these Quadrennials, under Michael Tingley, Richard Pilbrow, and Scott Georgeson. We have presented hundreds of American designers, students, and architects in this worldwide exposition and encouraged countless others to travel to Prague to partake in the concurrent activities. We no longer need to explain what the PQ is; rather designers seek us out to inquire about how to have their work shown there.

The catalog of achievements would be incomplete without the mention of support offered by three luminaries in USITT's international realm: Joel Rubin, who has provided me with his histories and insights; Dick Durst, who is always generous with his time and experience; and Leon Brauner, a gentle expert in navigating international politesse. My husband, Joseph, was always ready with quiet support and clear perceptions.

Many other volunteers, equally dedicated and too numerous to list, have offered their assistance for heightening our presence in world theatre, and our members are actively engaging in theatre globally bringing their experiences back to share with the membership. I am privileged to have served in what I believe to be the best job in USITT linking our members to the world and the world to our members through our conferences, OISTAT, and the PQ. Thank you for entrusting me with this mantle.

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
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Conference & Stage Expo Planning Includes Noshing

Not long ago, I asked my theatre students what "TMZ" stands for. As I suspected, they had no idea other than that it was the name of a Hollywood gossip web site and television show. I explained to them that "TMZ" refers to the "thirty-mile zone," also known as the "studio zone." In the entertainment industry, the TMZ is the area within a 30-mile radius of the intersection of West Beverly Boulevard and North La Cienega Boulevard in Los Angeles. Industry labor unions use this zone to determine rates and work rules for their members including additional compensation for travel time between the studio and an outside-the-zone location.

With the Hollywood TMZ in mind, I consulted my map to see what might be of interest to USITT members within the Long Beach 30-mile zone—the LBTMZ. A book could be written on this subject, but I've limited myself to four categories.

Airports



When flying in for the 2012 Annual Conference, there are three choices within the TMZ - the Long Beach Municipal Airport (LGB), Los Angeles International Airport (LAX), and Orange County's John Wayne Airport (SNA). More about getting to and from the airports will be included in a future article.

Scenic Drives

Access to a car and the desire for beautiful scenery in the LBTMZ could lead to a trip either north or south along the coast. Driving north takes the driver along the beautiful Palos Verdes Peninsula, then Redondo Beach, Hermosa Beach, and Manhattan Beach to LAX. Heading south leads through Seal Beach, Huntington Beach, and Newport Beach (near John Wayne Airport) to the artists' colony of Laguna Beach. The weather in late March should be splendid and so should the drive.

Museums

Besides the obvious ones, there are some favorite, smaller museums that are not usually heard of. These include the Museum of Neon in downtown L.A., the Museum of Jurassic Technology on Venice Blvd., and the Pasadena Museum of California Art. There's also the George C. Page Museum in Hancock Park, next to LACMA. It's a great museum for young and old that includes a large collection of Ice Age fossils (mammoths, mastodons, saber-toothed cats—cool stuff like that) that have been discovered in the La Brea Tar Pits adjacent to the museum.

Home Cooking

Great food of nearly any sort can be found in the LBTMZ, but since this is the July issue of *Sightlines*, with Independence Day cook-outs around the corner, I should mention a signature California dish. It's Santa Maria-style "barbecued" beef tri-tip roast (grilled, actually, over a red oak fire). It's typically served with pinquito beans, salsa, green salad, and grilled French bread. Tri-tip is served in many California steak houses and barbecue joints, but why wait until next March to sample some? Variations on the simple, traditional recipe are easily found on the internet, so give it a try this summer. It goes especially well with a good red wine or microbrew from the Central Coast - but lemonade will do just fine.
