

USITT's new Vice-President for Programming, Tom Hackman, may hold a new job title with the organization, but he brings years of experience in helping create and run the Annual Conference & Stage Expo to the position.

Tom notes that his family has literally grown up with his involvement with USITT. His daughter Caroline was born after he served as a Conference Photographer for the 2005 Annual Conference & Stage Expo in Toronto, Ontario, Canada and his fellow Conference Committee members eagerly awaited the birth of his second child, Cyrus, while he was Programming Co-coordinator. Over the years, reports and updates on their progress have leavened many long meetings.

He credits LaVahn Hoh with bringing him into the organization, and the Health & Safety Commission with making him feel welcome and involved. He remembers as a student having his

portfolio reviewed by Dick Block and Steve Gillian at the encouragement of Tom Bloom. They were not kind, but Tom worked to improve his presentation and the next year asked them again for a critique. That led to a job offer and his first ever professional summer gig, which reinforced the importance of networking SIGHTLINES ARCHIVE » within USITT. Tom received his undergraduate degree from Davis & Elkins College, one of only two NAST-accredited programs in West Virginia. He is very proud that this small liberal arts program recognizes the importance of that designation, and has returned there twice, now serving as Associate Professor and Dean of the West Virginia Governor's School of the Arts, a three-week summer residential program. "They learn about themselves and their art," he says, noting how rewarding it is to see students at different levels thrive. For USITT, he sees his role as encouraging programming to thrive as well. He notes that he is following in the footsteps of several great individuals who have put in place outstanding programing, and he will continue that, while finding potential that is not currently being tapped. "We do some amazing sessions and we need people to be aware of how they can connect and be part of the process." He wants to bring more constituencies into programming and help them make connections, and give the Commissions the support they need to do their sessions. "My job is to make programming happen, not to only create it. I'm a TD, I'm used to making thing happen." Tom says that TD training means he likes to "design and build stuff" whether it is scenery, props, or a new program. His children have a zebra for a swing, scaled-down pieces from a 100-year-old carousel showing that he does not think within any box. He also creates furniture, and has carved rocking horses, which his children adore. "Spare" time is in very limited supply around the Hackman household, but Tom still will participate in cave rescues if called upon. He used to be more active in caving, which he started in college, but the fear of spreading white-nose disease among native bat populations has curtailed that as a hobby. 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



Conference Culminates 50th Anniversary, Awards Presented

This year's conference was the culmination of TCG's 50th anniversary and the beginning of TCG's year-round conference and online community, Conference 2.0.

The conference theme of Model the Movement invited attendees to transform their field into a movement for the digital age. Executive Director Teresa Eyring also publically shared, for the first time, TCG's new vision statement.

TCG presented the following awards at the conference:

- Theatre Practitioner Award Michael Maso has led The Huntington's administrative and financial operations since 1982, producing more than 160 plays in partnership with three artistic directors and leading The Huntington's 10-year drive to build the Stanford Calderwood Pavilion at the Boston Center for the Arts.

- Peter Zeisler Memorial Award 24th Street Theatre Company, based in Los Angeles, California, produces theatre for all ages as well as arts education and community outreach programming.
- Visionary Leadership Award Ed Bullins has written over 50 plays dealing with the intricacies of the black experience in America. Mr. Bullins entered the literary world during the Black Power Movement, a period of racial pride and social consciousness.
- The Alan Schneider Director Award Bart DeLorenzo is the founding artistic director of the Evidence Room in Los Angeles. He has directed productions at the Geffen Playhouse, South Coast Repertory, the Kirk Douglas Theater, the Cleveland Playhouse, CalArts, and the Odyssey Theater, including premieres of Donald Margulies, Roberto Aguirre-Sacasa, and Justin Tanner.

Portable Stage, Fall Arrest Draft Standards in Review

BSR E1.21 - 201x, Entertainment Technology - Temporary Ground-Supported Structures Used to Cover the Stage Areas and Support Equipment in the Production of Outdoor Entertainment Events, and BSR E1.39 - 201x, are in review through September 24. The reviews are over when the end date of September 25 is reached and may be downloaded for free at tsp.plasa.org/tsp/documents/public_review_docs.php.

BSR E1.21 is a revision of ANSI E1.21 -2006. It is being revised to cover the design, manufacture, and use of all the portable structures (not only roofs) used to support scenery, lighting, and sound equipment, and to cover the stages in the production of outdoor entertainment events.

BSR E1.39 is a draft of a new standard being written to establish minimum requirements for the selection and use of personal fall arrest systems on portable structures in the entertainment industry. It also establishes minimum requirements for manufacturers and owners of these structures being used as work platforms.

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N. Clark Bowlen, 71, died January 8 following a courageous struggle with a debilitating illness.

Mr. Bowlen, a stage set and lighting designer and producer, was a senior member of USITT. He was an emeritus professor of communication at Manchester Community College, and founding member of Shakespeare Hartford and Veterans' Memorial Theatre Company. Mr. Bowlen served on the board of Company One Theater and The Repertory Theater Company of New Britain, and was vice president of Veterans' Memorial Theatre Company.

An innovative theater professional, he stretched the boundaries of classical works, including Shakespeare, while

preserving original language and artistic continuity. He was an early adapter of computer design and screen projections. His sets were minimal, open spaces allowing dramatic lighting and articulated characters to engage audiences. Mr. Bowlen received the prestigious Ming Cho Lee Design Award for his *Glass Menagerie* set.

Additionally, he supported new works by local playwrights and led the original development of M.C.C.'s internationally acclaimed *Came So Far for Beauty: The Music of Leonard Cohen*.

He was an avid kayaker and founding member of Conyak, leading weeklong wilderness trips through New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, and Maine. He loved downhill skiing and was a devoted conservationist.

He is survived by his wife and artistic partner, Kathleen Keena; his brother Bruce, wife Rachel and son Christopher; and his sister Beverly, husband Sam Williams, and daughters Laura and Paige and many other family and friends.

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
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Frederick J. March, 73, of San Marcos, Texas, died August 6.

He received his BA and MA from Texas Tech University and served on the faculty of Texas State University (then Southwest Texas State), with positions that included: 1967-83 as tech director and scenic designer, 1983-88 as director of theatre, 1988-99 as chair of the department of theatre, and in 1999 was named professor emeritus. Mr. March was an Army veteran.

He served on the National Board of Directors for USITT, was a founding member of the Texas (now Southwest) Regional Section in 1971, and subsequently served as Secretary/Treasurer, and President for the Regional Section.

He had been active in TETA and received its Educator of the Year Award (1988) and Founders Award (1983). He was president from 1993 to 1995. Mr. March received two Excellence in Design awards from ACTF.

Frederick Christoffel, Chair/Scene Designer Professor of Design at Texas Tech noted "As a student at Tech, under Cliff Ashby's direction Fred designed and supervised the first 'theatre with-in a theatre' built on the Mainstage for the first Summer Rep in 1966, called "Three in Three-Quarter."


That structure was used until 1968, when Fred was hired to supervise construction of the elliptical in-the-round structure, also built on Mainstage, design by Ashby.

USITT's Immediate Past President Joe Aldridge recalled, "Fred and I were friends from TTU. In fact, on the Summer Rep seating from 1968, I was the student carpenter on that gig. My first summer stock position."

A Celebration of Life service was held August 11 at Cheatham Street Warehouse in San Marcos.

He is survived by two sons, Joe March and wife, Ann of Hoover, Alabama, and David March and wife, Joyce Griffith of Durango, Colorado; daughter, Wendy March Mueller and husband, Larry of Denver, Colorado; and three grandchildren, Madison and Caelan March, and Gemma Mueller.

- Commissioning essays by senior scholars around the world to discuss issues relating to theatre history and historiography;







The 2013 Student International Travel Grant program opens September 15, 2012.



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The Last Word: **Puppet Boot Camp a Blast!** Joel Ebarb Costume Design & Technology Commission

Puppetry is one of the most exciting and evocative of the performing arts. For three days in early August, 36 brave and adventurous "puppet people" congregated near the Crossroads of America to experience the story-telling power of the anthropomorphic objects called puppets.

Joel Ebarb, symposium instructor and organizer, put the participants through their paces by teaching the skills necessary to construct and perform four different types of puppets: scarf marionettes (a training puppet created by the great Albrecht Roser), "Muppet" style open-mouth puppets in the style of the great puppeteer Jim Henson, "mystical and magical" shadow puppets, and Chinese-style rod puppets created from recycled plastic juice containers. He was assisted by Kathryn Wagner and Rachel Lambert.

The pace was fast and furious. Participants cut, pasted, patterned,



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glued, stitched, and decorated at breakneck speed. When all was said and done, everyone was astounded that they had learned and created as



much as they had. Said one participant, "I thought there is no way we will ever get all of this done – but we did, and it was an amazing experience!"

One of the highlights of the symposium was the section devoted to shadow puppets, which culminate in mini-theatricals of one minute or less involving at least two characters. Puppets included zombies, dancing hippos, an undersea encounter between a mermaid and a diver, and an appearance by the singer formerly known as Prince.

However, the three days were not all work. The Costume Symposium was held on the campus of Purdue University in West Lafayette, Indiana, one hour away from the capital city of Indianapolis. The group traveled there for a cultural mini-vacation, visiting the beautiful Indianapolis Museum of Art with its exceptional gardens.


The group enjoyed a special tour of a textiles exhibit highlighting the designs of American designers with Indiana roots such as Halston, Blass, Norell, and Sprouse. Symposium participants also enjoyed discovering the restaurants and specialty stores around Purdue, in particular Von's Shoppes, home to millions of beads, books, and bibelots.

The workshop concluded with a final group exercise where all participants



and their Muppet-style puppets performed an energetic and highly entertaining group lip-sync to Journey's "Don't Stop Believing" as performed by the actors from the popular television program *Glee*. To quote one participant, "I could do this all day! This was the most fun I have had in years!"

Standards Incorporated into UL Reference

After more than 17 years of work—first by USITT (USITT Standard S3-1997), then by ESTA, then by PLASA—configuration requirements for stage pin connectors are being incorporated into UL 498, the standard used for Listing connectors.

ANSI E1.24-2012 is being incorporated by reference into UL 498, which will do much eliminate problems with connectors from different manufacturers not fitting together at all, or fitting together but with the dangers of arcing and overheating. However, the additional requirements may require stage pin connectors to be modified in order to maintain their listing under UL 498.

UL has proposed that products needing modification to maintain their Listing to be modified within three years of the publication of the revised UL 498.

Charles Berliner Retires

Congratulations to Charles Berliner, who retired at the end of August after many years of service with United Scenic Artists-Local 829 on the West Coast. Charlie has been a well-known designer of scenery and costumes for plays, musicals, film, television, and dance theatre.

He is one of a handful of theatrical designer recipients of a Design Arts Fellowship from the National Endowment for the Arts, and his designs have been included in national and international exhibitions.

Charlie has participated in USITT Annual Conference & Stage Expo activities for many years, including helping to organize special exhibits and present sessions. We wish him well in retirement.

The creation of the Guthrie Theater in Minneapolis, Minnesota in 1963 was a defining event in American Theatre. It became the flagship of the Professional Regional Theatre movement opening with a company of actors presenting three plays in repertory, housed in a unique type of theatre with more than 1,400 seats surrounding an asymmetrical platform stage on three sides. There was no proscenium, no flies, and very little backstage. It was a stage that required some new thought about stagecraft and production techniques.

Two hundred ninety-one shows were produced and performed on this stage at the Original Guthrie over 44 years. The location of this building, an icon of American Theater, is now a grassy slope. Although the original building is gone, the Guthrie Theater is very much alive and well celebrating its 50th anniversary in its new, iconic building on the banks of the Mississippi River. The new building has three theaters and full support services for the theater company's operation.



The Department of Labor website describes the holiday:

Labor Day, the first Monday in September, is a creation of the labor movement and is dedicated to the social and economic achievements of American workers. It constitutes a yearly national tribute to the contributions workers have made to the strength, prosperity, and well-being of our country.

My favorite part, though, is the website's discussion of how the observance began. As is often the case, the credit for being "first" is disputed. My own little community of Boalsburg, Pennsylvania claims to be the originator of Memorial Day, but more than two dozen other communities make the same claim.

In the case of Labor Day, it comes down to two versions. One credits Peter J. McGuire, general secretary of the Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners and a cofounder of the American Federation of Labor, but others suggest it was SIGHTLINES ARCHIVE »

Matthew Maguire, a machinist who was later the secretary of Local 344 of the International Association of Machinists in Paterson, New Jersey.

For me, the fact that both of these gentlemen were hands-on creators is an important distinction. Mr. McGuire's quote to describe the American worker to be honored was those "who from rude nature have delved and carved all the grandeur we behold." Isn't that what we do? Each of us starts with a story and then brings to it a unique component of our own creation. The final product is then shared with many who likely have no idea of the skilled hands and minds that were part of creating it, yet that product engages, delights, and inspires them no less.

As I write this, I've just returned from the August Board of Director meetings held at Disney World in Florida. Talk about simple stories turned into grand experiences! Besides the Board Members, Commissioners and the Conference Committee held meetings during what was a long weekend of activities. Many of the attendees arrived early with their families and enjoyed the recreational offerings before getting down to the business of the Institute. All the staff that we encountered were excellent hosts, but special thanks should go to Jack Feivou, long time USITT member and volunteer and new addition to the board, for all his assistance in making our visit magical.

Last month I shared that part of our work at these meetings would include the beginning of a new strategic planning process. I am happy to report that it didn't seem like work at all. Led by our consultant, Leslie Marqua, everyone was engaged and energized by the session that we started with on Friday morning and continued on Saturday morning. Leslie stayed with us for our formal board meetings in the afternoons interjecting her perspective on occasion as appropriate. The ad hoc committee, chaired by Immediate Past President Joe Aldridge, includes board and non-board members, all of whom attended. Non-board members include John Uthoff, Tim Kaufmann, and Ben Gasper with board representation from Joe, Dan Culhane, David Krajec, Sherry Wagner-Henry, David Grindle and me. That group also met for the first time in person with Leslie on Friday evening.

Even though this process has just begun, I can promise you that all involved so far are committed to and excited about the future of USITT and mindful that the membership is central to what that future should look like.

On a related, but separate topic, some of you may have participated in an electronic USITT member survey last winter. That survey was the result of a charge to an ad hoc committee comprised of Fellows of the Institute to create and, with the assistance of the Staff, distribute a survey to the membership. The goal was to measure member satisfaction with services and benefits currently offered. Generally speaking, the feedback was very positive, but in terms of providing improvements, there is greater need to attend to the concerns expressed.

To make the data more useful, the same ad hoc committee has done further work to sort and group the collected data according to several categories and subcategories so that areas of responsibility could be identified for further action. Since data collection of various types is typically part of assessment and strategic planning, it was determined that the winter survey data would be forwarded first to the Strategic Planning Committee. Everyone on the Survey Committee agreed that this would assure that strengths and weaknesses identified by the survey would be addressed in a meaningful, proactive way.

So as you enjoy your Labor Day holiday (and I know some of you will not get that day as a day away from work), keep in mind that, through the work we share, each of us has contributed to "the strength, prosperity, and well-being of our country."


Northern Boundary: Plan Fall Conference

How do you eat a 94 ounce steak? One bite at a time.

I've said this over and over to myself and others since coming to this position. There are so many great ideas put forward for programming, member benefits, and other things, where do you start?

Our recent member survey, done just prior to the Annual Conference, showed that our members are generally happy with the service they get and are willing to say where things aren't as great. The latter was probably the best part of what we got from the responses.

Since we returned from Long Beach, a group of members has been working to distill the comments into action. Happily, we can say there are things that are already coming to a reality. Our web upgrades are due to launch this month giving members many of the online resources they said they wanted.

Cost for members to attend the 2013 Annual Conference in Milwaukee is the same as it was in Long Beach for all categories. Hotels in Milwaukee cost less. All of these are things the membership commented upon that were already in the works.

It doesn't stop here. The Strategic Planning Committee, chaired by Immediate

Past President Joe Aldridge, is using the results of that survey along with other member feedback, to help lay a plan for the next five years. This is extremely important as it helps us articulate which of the areas to focus on and tackle. We are back to the steak analogy. Without a plan, we will never achieve the seemingly impossible task.

USITT is an amazing organization that produces incredible results. The leadership, staff, and membership are not content to rest upon success but to build upon it. But that takes time and a plan. That plan takes comments, feedback, and input. For two years as President, Joe Aldridge openly called upon the membership to contact him if they had questions, comments, or concerns. I too have that same policy. As the Strategic Planning Committee works to bring a document forward to the membership, don't hesitate to contact either of us.

If you filled out the survey, that voice has been added to the mix. But if other ideas have come to mind or you didn't get to the survey, reach out and let your thoughts be heard. This plan will do its best to chart a course for the Institute that goes where the members need it to go. We all know it won't be perfect, and it won't address every concern or meet everyone's expectation. But it will be a plan made by the membership, with input from the membership, for the membership. Autumn is here and it is already time to prepare for spring and anticipate the 2013 Conference & Stage Expo in Milwaukee, Wisconsin along with the annual Costume Design & Technology Poster Session.

Past costume poster sessions, 16 years' worth, will soon be available in the digital archive on the USITT website. It's still in a rough format and work is continuing to finesse it. The Costume Poster editors have been busy collecting and organizing what can be found of the history of this event, but there are missing handouts needed to complete it. See the end of this article for missing handouts.

But wait, there's more! In the past, authors and presenters of posters were limited by 10- to 15-year-old technology or what could be carried to the Annual Conference. Some past authors have gone further than just replacing what was and have expanded their information or added color photos. There is virtually (pun intended) no space limit with the archive. Others are encouraged to do the same. Again, contact M.C. Friedrich via e-mail to update a contribution.

Those who want to present at the 2013 Costume Design & Technology Poster Session may be part of the future in Milwaukee by submitting an abstract this fall to share innovations with peers. Go to www.usitt.org to find the instructors under the Conference tab.

During the Poster Session, designers and technicians share information that may not be well known or perhaps is a new invention. Review the list of past posters to see the depth and breadth of creativity.

Poster presentations, and the digital archive, are widely accepted as meeting the requirements for scholarly publication. Those who work for an educational institution might be able to get the school to fund some or all expenses to the Milwaukee 2013 Annual Conference & Stage Expo. Poster presenters also may have the opportunity to publish their ideas in *TD&T*.

All submissions will be blind juried by the Costume Poster Selection Committee. Ideas need to be presented in the form of an abstract. Examples of past successful abstracts can be found here.

The process for submitting an abstract and a 50-word bio will be through the website this year, a change from the e-mail format of the past. The biographies of accepted poster presenters will be used for the Annual Conference program.

The deadline to submit abstracts is November 15. All applicants will be notified by early December. Accepted presenters will be sent a list of guidelines. The actual presentation and handout information are not due until February 22.

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

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Conference & Stage Expo Find A Fellow -- Again Tim Kelly USITT Fellow




Which of these USITT Fellows will be participating in the 2013 version of the Find a Fellow contest for USITT student members?
