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
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
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News & Notices Member Spotlight: Madilynn Garcia

Madilynn Garcia, emerging theatre manager, 2015 graduate of the University of Texas at Austin, alumnus of USITT's Gateway Program, alumnus of Oregon Shakespeare Festival's FAIR (Fellowships, Assistantships, Internships, and Residencies) program, and current USITT Gateway Program Coordinator.

USITT: Tell us a little about how you got to the Gateway Program?

Madilynn: I grew up in Wylie, a small town outside of Dallas, TX, and I went to UT-Austin for my BA in Theatre and Dance. I worked for David Stewart, then Academic Production Manager at UT-Austin, as a production associate for over two years. Shortly after the death of





Tayneshia Jefferson in late 2013, he was involved in creating the Gateway program, and one day at work he sat me down and said, 'OK, here's the deal. You're going to the USITT Conference.'

To further the program, USITT was asking institutions to partner to send students to the Conference. Texas Performing Arts at UT-Austin agreed to help, so I became the first Gateway partnership mentee.

So you attended your first Conference in 2014 as a Gateway mentee.

I was a little nervous. I'm kind of introverted and I wouldn't know anyone else there besides David (Stewart). So I went to this Conference with 5,000 people! We got there early and met other people

from the USITT Diversity Initiative, and learned about the development of the Gateway program, which helped me feel less intimidated.

My mentor was Erin Joy Swank, and she was a rock star who has worn many hats over the course of her

career. I learned a great deal about USITT and about the community that's there. At the time I was 20 years old and absolutely entranced by everyone I met. People were thrilled about what was happening with Gateway, and they still are. And that embrace is very much felt.

How did Gateway lead you to OSF's FAIR program?

I knew I was interested in working for OSF, and while at the USITT People of Color Network meeting, we were going around the room and Sharifa Johka (FAIR Experience Manager at OSF) introduced herself. Dstew physically pushed me away and said, 'Don't come back till you have her card.' So I approached her and said, 'I want to work at OSF,' and her response was, 'Let's make it happen.' And literally one year later I was packing my bags for Oregon. I'm so excited about the recently announced partnership between Gateway and FAIR. It's a fantastic connection for both organizations and young professionals.

Describe your experience in the FAIR program?

I was excited to do work in the literary office, but also for the FAIR experience. The FAIR cohort met once a week to talk about our experiences and ideas, and to build conversations around equity, diversity, and inclusion.

It was interesting because I was coming to the West Coast as a Latina from a very diverse city, Austin, to a very white place. At OSF, the diversity is happening mostly onstage and the rest of the organization is catching up. So that was overwhelming and even jarring in a way. So the FAIR cohort, which ranged from six to 25 people during



my stay, was easily the most diverse group on campus. It was always the most refreshing part of my week.

Both Gateway and FAIR gave me invaluable experience in the field as well as an agent of change. I am a first-generation college student who put myself through

school. As someone who was raised by a single mom, I never even thought I would go to college, so it's been very critical to me to know that I can have a place in the world of theatre.

What are you doing now?

I have been working as a production associate and freelancing in Austin while looking for a more long-term place to be. I'm very interested in being part of institutional change in the industry and I'm figuring out what that means as an early career professional. My education has given me a strong background in theatre history and criticism while most of my professional experience has focused on management. At this point, I'm focusing on the latter of those skill sets and looking forward to the next step.

How did you end up becoming USITT's Gateway coordinator?

It all happened so quickly. After the 2014 Conference, David and Kasey Allee-Foreman asked if I wanted to be on the Diversity Committee and my response was, 'Of course!' And that's been phenomenal. I'm surrounded by so many people who are so passionate and committed to changing this field for the better, so I really enjoy serving on the committee. It's a fun group and we know how to

hit the ground running. At the conference last year, the group was discussing who would be the coordinator for Gateway in 2016. There was a slow head-turn from the group and I knew it was the perfect opportunity to step up.

I'm also excited to serve as the program coordinator for the next Gateway cohort at USITT 2016. I've navigated the Conference before and I'm a good example of what the membership looks like in 2016. So I'm someone who can make an impact by being there, and by helping further the work of diversity, equity, and inclusion in our field.

Thanks so much! See you in Salt Lake City!

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
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News & Notices In Memoriam: Sonny Sonnenfeld Randy Earle USITT Fellow

Memories of Sonny

On Wednesday, Feb. 10, the lighting community lost one of its stars. Sonny Sonnenfeld died at age 96, just weeks after learning he had won USITT's 2016 Distinguished Achievement in Lighting Design & Technology Award.

A founding member of the Institute and a Fellow since 1997, Sonny called USITT "my continuing education program." He also founded the Broadway Lighting Master Classes and the annual Stage Lighting Super Saturday in New York.



He was both a legendary entertainment lighting salesman and a pioneer in architectural lighting. Architectural Lighting Magazine named him to its Lighting Legends Hall of Fame in 2001. In 2003 he received the Wally Russell Lifetime Achievement Award.

Sonny's companion, award-winning lighting designer Jennifer Tipton, will accept his award from USITT's Lighting Design & Technology Commission and participate in a tribute to Sonny led by his friend Scott Parker on Friday, March 18, at 5:30 p.m.

Meanwhile, Sonny's life was celebrated far and wide, with many industry leaders and publications honoring his contributions.

Here are some excerpts:

From Fred Foster, CEO of ETC, where Sonny worked for 10 years until 2004:

"Sonny *cared*. He cared about lighting, he cared about business, but most of all, Sonny cared about his customers.

When I first heard about him from ETC Vice President of Sales Mark Vassallo (then a rep for ETC), his stories and lessons about selling focused on the customer. From before he formally became part of ETC, and well after he "retired" for the first time, everyone who knew him would tell of a lesson that they had learned from him.

"Sonny's care for his customers was returned to him many times over. There were consultants who would only specify what Sonny sold. This

was not because of any underhanded maneuver on Sonny's part; it was because they had proof over the years that he would take care of them if anything went wrong on a job. Sonny didn't buy this loyalty. He earned it. And he taught a lot of us how important it is to take care of customers."

From Lighting & Sound America:

"Famed for his ability to sell, and for such techniques as showing up at a client's office armed with bagels and the latest industry gossip, Sonnenfeld told *LSA*: "My creed as a salesman, as well as in life, is a simple one: 1. Respect your customers. 2. She/he is probably smarter than you are. 3. Never fake it. Say, 'I don't know, but I will find out and get back to you' -- and do so. 4. Be honest; don't lie. 5. Start early and work late. 6. Make friends with your customers. I have become friends with some spectacularly wonderful people."

From friend and USITT Fellow Bill Sapsis of Sapsis Rigging, Inc:

"The indomitable and legendary Sonny Sonnenfeld passed away this morning, in his sleep, in the apartment he shared with Jennifer Tipton. For a little guy he was huge. His influence in the lighting industry is incalculable. He offered his insights, and there were many, into the industry at the Broadway Lighting Master Classes, Super Saturday and NATEAC, to name just a few.

I got to know him in 2012 when I

invited him to speak; no. wait. That's not accurate. It was when he invited himself to speak at NATEAC 2012. I didn't argue, of course and he was wonderful on the dais, a cup of Benedictine in his hand. He had planned to reprise that role at NATEAC this coming summer but, sadly, that won't happen."

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News & Notices Q2Q's Steve to Play Larger Role in **USITT 2016**

Last year, Steve Younkins came to USITT 2015 in Cincinnati to sign prints of his hugely popular theatre tech comic strip, Q2Q Comics. His event drew hundreds of fans and solidified his idea to make a book.

This year, Steve is coming to USITT 2016 in Salt Lake City to sign the book, which he crowd-funded to the tune of \$40,000 and had printed just in time for the show.




"I had to do a rush order to print 100 copies for the Conference, so USITT 2016 will be the first place people can get their hands on the book," he said. "In fact, it likely will be the first time I get to see a full copy of the book!"

Q2Q Comics Vol. 1, which collects his first 220 strips plus some concept art and commentary, will be sold at the USITT bookstore at the Salt Palace Convention Center-- along with Steve's "Anatomy of" prints of his eight Q2Q characters (Anatomy of a Stage Manager, Sound Designer, Props Master, etc.) and black Q2Q Tshirts with his sayings, "It's Tech Week Somewhere," "Tech Week is Coming" and "Thank You Five."




As he did last year, Steve also will sell original Q2Q strips at his Saturday, March 19, signing event. And on Thursday, March 17, he'll be a featured speaker at USITT's Young Designers & Technicians (YD&T) Awards.

Younkins, resident sound designer for the Maryland Ensemble Theatre, said the past year has been an adventure.



For USITT 2015, he enlisted a props artisan from Seattle who he met through an online theatre tech blog to help him sell comics and sign prints. Liz Hastings, a veteran of several USITT Conferences, became his girlfriend and studio assistant.

At the show, Steve promised to unveil two new characters – a props master named Samantha and a scenic designer named Garvis. Garvis resembles Steve's former roommate, he said. Samantha is partly based on Liz.



"I had the character designed before I met Liz, but Liz has definitely helped me write her, and she's my sounding board," Steve said. "There's a lot of her in the character. However, the red hair is a complete coincidence!"

He and Liz have a lot to celebrate besides their one-year anniversary at USITT 2016. "Having the comic become so popular has allowed me to take the jobs I'm most interested in as a sound designer," he said. "The book is also helping pay for some improvements to my workshop."


He's also excited that USITT Executive Director David Grindle asked him to speak on "risk-taking in design and tech" at the 2016 YD&T Awards.

"I'm kind of an out-of-the-box sound designer, so I get asked to do a lot of weird or avant-garde shows, with soundscapes and noise-making. So risk-taking plays right into my design wheelhouse," he said. "And I'm honored to be asked to be there to help celebrate these young designers and technicians."



That's right, he'll be speaking as a sound designer ... and a cartoonist.

"I can't not talk about the comic," he said. "And the comic is, in fact, a theatrical

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SoundLab 2016: A Slate of Audio Creativity, Experiences



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News & Notices SoundLab 2016: A Slate of Creative Audio Experiences

USITT 2016 in Salt Lake City will host the third incarnation of the Sound Design & Technology Commission's SoundLab project.

While previous years were more focused on equipment and systems, this year's SoundLab is focused on the process and creative elements of sound design – with help from some sound names like Britain's John Leonard and Off-Broadway's Elisheba Ittoop. From the beginning, the intention was to create an atmosphere that resembled the theatre environment as much as possible.

Inspired by the multi-channel design work of the late Stephen Brown of the Exchange Theatre, the idea behind SoundLab 2016 was born. The intention is to create a multichannel surround system which would be installed in a ballroom in Salt Lake City and would provide the participant with not only the opportunity to experience the design in a theatrical environment, but the ability to walk around that environment and see how the system was put together.

With these goals in mind, New York designer Jim van Bergen was recruited to design a system that was not only flexible enough to serve many purposes, but also used multiple manufacturers in its design. Van Bergen used loudspeakers from Meyer Sound, d&b Audiotechnik, and L-Acoustics to create a system that includes sub-systems for vocal reinforcement, music playback, and surround effects. With some infrastructure help from the folks at Clearwing, an environment in which unique programming could really shine was created. DiGiCo is providing digital consoles for the Lab.

On Tuesday, March 15, the SoundLab will host a Professional Development Workshop in Advanced QLab techniques for surround systems. This will be a great opportunity to learn techniques and solutions for using Qlab in a surround setting. Taught by Sam Kusnetz and Andy Lang from Figure 53, participants can

The Arts are for Everyone is both a USITT 2016 session to be chaired by Cameron Jackson, and a goal of USITT's service to the arts production community.

Scheduled for 1 to 4 p.m. Thursday, March 17, the session's full title is *The Arts are for Everyone: ABILITY, ACCESS, and THEATRE: EFFECTING SUCCESS.* It's one of several new sessions on

SUCCESS. It's one of several new sessions on accessibility, diversity, and inclusion being offered at USITT 2016 in Salt Lake City.

The three-hour session features a panel of six arts managers, including Jackson, who are leading the movement to involve people of all abilities and backgrounds in their arts productions.

Jackson's fellow presenters include Bryce Alexander, artistic director of Denver's Phamaly Theatre Company, formerly known as the Physically Handicapped Actors & Musical Artists League, and Stephanie Barton-Farcas, artistic & development director of Nicu's Spoon Theatre Company, New York City's first all-inclusive theatre group.

Phamaly provides theatrical opportunities for people with disabilities, including several levels of free performance classes. Bryce Alexander also has been a pioneer in originating sensory-friendly

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performances for audiences with sensory disabilities.

Barton-Farcas named her theatre

company Nicu's Spoon after adopting a child from a Romanian orphanage who overcame "impossible" physical and mental challenges - including learning to feed himself at age 5 –before his death in 1996. "We are completely committed to involving the full spectrum of diverse and multi-abled in everything we do," she wrote on the group's website.

With help from these and other panelists, Jackson said he is excited to "engage in both a deep and practical discussion on how we as theatre-makers can see with different eyes, broaden, and protect accessibility to the arts."

That means "Backstage, onstage, and in the audience," Jackson wrote in the session description. "Amputees in the costume shop. Wheelers onstage. Audio describers in the booth. Numerous organizations have devised creative ways of adapting the arts-place for the unique needs of company members and patrons: from catwalks to dressing rooms, ticketing to casting. Nearly 1 in 5 Americans has a disability; with creativity and intention, organizations have extensive opportunities to utilize their diverse talents. What about hiring a lighting designer who uses a wheelchair? An intern who is deaf? Or making all performances accessible to all patrons?

"Hear from those at the forefront of disability arts inclusion about successful strategies to jumpstart the conversation and move forward into practical application. Engage with peers to identify barriers in your own organization, and devise options for making change. As theatre makers, we have the opportunity to spark universal conversations about the human condition - let's include people of all abilities in the mix!"

This and several other sessions are part of USITT's Diversity & Inclusion Initiative, challenging the Institute and the entertainment design and technology industry to find ways to better nurture accessibility, diversity, equity, and inclusion.

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
The Last Word: Meet Our 2016 Keynote Presenter, Tupac Martir!



On Saturday and Sunday the participants had to choose from 36 workshops that covered a wide range



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
