# Member Spotlight: Ryan Cole

Ryan Cole, Project Manager for JR Clancy, Inc., Technical Director, recent graduate of Florida State University with MFA in Technical Production.

# **USITT:** Describe your first experience of theatre.

**Ryan:** I first took a Tech Drama class in the fall of my sophomore year at Brooke Point High School to fill my elective credit towards graduation.

While in the class we had an opportunity to earn some extra credit if we volunteered to be on running crew for the production that semester, so I chose to sign up. We did Arthur Miller's *Playing for Time* and I really enjoyed the experience and the people I got to work with on the production. In the classroom, I also enjoyed the fact that I was allowed to use power tools to build the scenery.

# Tell us a little about your background -- where did you grow up?

I grew up in Stafford, VA. I have two brothers (one is my fraternal twin). My twin brother just finished his service in the US Army and my little brother is currently in grad school at East Carolina University. I actually wanted to be a veterinarian for most of my childhood until my first dog died and I came to the realization that I would have to be the one to do that to animals at the end of their lives. I couldn't bear that thought, so I dropped the idea and began exploring other options.

# What drew you to technical theatre?

Technical theatre was not my first interest in life, but was really a gift of circumstances. I took that tech drama class to fill the elective credit and because I had not made the school soccer team that last spring and did not want to participate in the conditioning that fall. Once I took the class, so many things pulled me into the world of technical theatre. I loved being able to use power tools at school and get my hands dirty. It really became my favorite class of the day. I also enjoyed the stories that theatre can tell. I always had a strong interest in the events of World War II, specifically the Holocaust, so when I learned we were doing *Playing for Time* I got even more excited that I was going to be part of that storytelling experience.

In the end, I think the biggest thing that drew me in was my teacher, Lisa Cover-Tucci. Lisa allowed me to explore all facets of theatrical production over the next three years of my high school career. I was an actor, scenic designer, assistant director, technical director, light board operator, running crew, etc., all because she



wanted me to learn as much as possible. Without her influence and guidance I would not have ever gotten into this field. To this day, there aren't many professional decisions I make in life without talking to her about it at some point.

# What led you to pursue Scenic Construction in college?

Scenic construction wasn't actually my first interest when I joined the theatre program at East Carolina University. I came in believing that I either wanted to do scenic design because of the opportunity Lisa Cover-Tucci had given me during my senior year of high school to do the design for our production of Neil Simon's Rumors, or to be a stage manager. That first fall of undergrad I took Reid Parker's Technical Theatre I class and was assigned to be on running crew for our production of Of Thee I Sing, so I could observe the stage managers running that show. One of the ASM's for the show was a student named Ted Griffith who was filling his production requirement for the Stage Management class. Through multiple conversations and experiences on that show, Ted convinced me I should switch to Scenic Construction that spring and to come work in the shop. I took him up on that offer and did not leave the shop after that. Reid Parker was and still is the Technical Director at East Carolina University and is one of the most influential people in my life and professional career. Like Lisa, Reid gave me as many opportunities as I wanted while working in the shop to learn and grow as a student, artist, and professional. Even though my degree said Scenic Construction, the education he was giving me truly set the foundation for a path to Technical Direction.

#### How did you decide to go to grad school?

I knew that I wanted to go to grad school during my senior year of undergrad, as Reid explained to me the importance of a graduate degree for technical directors. However, he did tell me that I should go work for at least a year to learn about the theatre industry from a professional perspective. I listened and went to work as the Scenic Construction Intern at CENTERSTAGE Theatre in Baltimore, MD, under the leadership of Tom Rupp. I learned an incredible amount while working at CENTERSTAGE but found myself observing the aches and pains of the other carpenters working in the shop and knowing that they were only ten years my senior. I did not want to be hurting in that way at that age, so I knew I needed to get to grad school and become a technical director. I had gone to visit Florida State University that previous summer to interview with Robert Coleman for a position in his program. He offered me a spot, so I applied that fall and was enrolled to begin in the fall of 2013.

# How did you get involved in USITT?

I went to my first USITT Conference in the spring of 2014 in Fort Worth, TX, while a student at FSU. Prior to grad school I had only attended SETC because it was

convenient to ECU and was great for finding summer work, but I had always wanted to attend USITT to explore the seminars and Stage Expo.

# How did you get a job with JR Clancy?

It all began as I was online checking out the different seminars being offered for USITT 2014 in Fort Worth to see what I wanted to attend. I stumbled across Stage Rigging 101 led by Bridget Cox and Patrick Finn. I knew I had a decent understanding of rigging from my experiences thus far, but wanted to read the description to see what was considered Rigging 101 for this Conference. For some reason, I also explored the bios for Bridget and Patrick, and discovered that Bridget was the Director of Project Management at JR Clancy and had attended East Carolina University like me. I could not pass up the opportunity to connect to a fellow Pirate and person of leadership with the industry's leading theatrical rigging manufacturer, so I emailed her and asked if she would be willing to meet with me at the Conference. I attended their session and met with her afterwards to say hello and ask if they had ever done a year-long internship in Project Management at JR Clancy. One of the opportunities that FSU offers for the third year of our graduate studies is to perform an internship in our field of study, and I thought that an internship with JR Clancy would be an excellent opportunity for this. She, fortunately, loved the idea and pitched it to the President, Mike Murphy, at the Conference. Over the next year and a half, Bridget and I stayed in communication and worked to develop this internship. I came to Syracuse, NY, in August of 2015 with my fiancé, Jennifer Lemcke, to perform the internship without the promise of a job offer at the end of the internship. Fortunately, fortune worked in my favor and as a result of my hard work and an increase in projects awarded to JR Clancy, I was offered a position as a Project Manager at JR Clancy. I went down to Tallahassee at the end of April 2016 to graduate with my MFA and began working as a full-time project manager on May 1st of this year.

# Name three future goals?

Move into a Leadership position at JR Clancy. Help develop/invent a new technology in the rigging industry. And influence the lives and education of rising students in our industry the way people like Lisa Cover-Tucci, Reid Parker, Robert Coleman, and so many others did for me.

# What would you tell a high school student interested in a technical theatre career?

Explore everything about the theatre industry including things outside of technical theatre. This is an industry of incredibly smart, artistic, creative, and generous people. Keep your mind open for new opportunities. I didn't know Project Management was a career to pursue until Jim Lile, an FSU professor, told me about it when I was discussing my goals for the future.

# What is the most important thing to know about rigging?

As my father always taught me, "If you aren't going to do it right, then don't do it at all." Safety is SO important in our industry. I love programs like TIM® (Train. Inspect. Maintain) at JR Clancy that promote safety in our field. Your safety is ALWAYS more important than any production or performance.

# Gateway Gears up for USITT 2017

USITT's Gateway Program will open nominations Sept. 1 for students and early career professionals from underrepresented groups in theatre production to receive professional mentoring and to participate in USITT 2017 in St. Louis, MO.



Twelve selected participants will pair

up with professional mentors for the 2017 USITT Annual Conference & Stage Expo. Gateway is open to student/early career members underrepresented in live entertainment design, technology, and management because of race/ethnicity, disability, and/or sexual or gender orientation.

Besides meeting a mentor from a similar background and field, Gateway mentees take part in special receptions and sessions on diversity and inclusion in the production industry. The program is part of USITT's effort to expand diversity in the industry.

2016 Gateway mentee Randy Wong-Westbrook of Ithaca College told the student newspaper that his ethnic group, Asian-Americans, are underrepresented in his field of scene design.



"I think what a disadvantage it is that there are few people like myself,"

Wong-Westbrook said. "That can be isolating sometimes, and one thing the mentorship offered me, being accepted into the Gateway Program, was kind of like ... when we talk about representation in movies and TV, you want to see yourself on the screen. I'm not a performer, but even still, in my industry I still want to see an older version of myself already active and already successful in the business."

# A Book Conceived at USITT

Cary Gillett and Jay Sheehan are production managers who live and work on opposite coasts, Gillett in the Washington, D.C. area and Sheehan in San Diego. When they met at USITT 2012 in Long Beach, CA, they were strangers in a common field. Today, they're co-authors whose book, *The Production Managers Toolkit*, is just out from Routledge/Focal Press.

"As [USITT] does for many, it connected the two of us based on common interests," they wrote in the book's introduction. "We realized we have similar jobs at similar institutions and that we both had recently started teaching production management. We swapped syllabi, discussed teaching techniques, and then asked the age-old question, 'What book do you use?'"

They continued their griping about the lack of texts for teaching production management a year later at USITT 2013 in Milwaukee. "We must have been pretty vocal ... because one colleague told us to stop complaining and write the book ourselves," they wrote. So they sketched out a table of contents, brought it to the Stage Expo floor, and pitched it to Focal Press.

The book is part of the Focal Press Toolkit Series which includes *The Assistant Lighting Designers Toolkit* by Anne E. McMills, *The Stagehand's Toolkit* by Kristi Ross-Clausen, and *The Stage Manager's Toolkit* by Laurie Kincman – all USITT members.

The new PM book fills a void about the field, whose practitioners usually come to it from stage management or technical direction without "starting out wanting to do this." The authors define production management as, among other things, "the ability to make sure a project happens on time, on budget, safely, and in the end everyone is still speaking to each other."

Their research included interviews with PMs "from all walks of life and all aspects of the performing arts." Key advisors were USITT Board Member David Stewart, production manager at the Guthrie Theater, and USITT VP-Commissions Carolyn Satter, PM and facilities manager at the San Diego Theatres.

"My favorite part of the process was the interviews," said Gillett, PM at the University of Maryland's School of Theatre, Dance and Performance Studies. "We interviewed 53 people for this book. With each interview, I felt more connected to the amazing network of production managers in this country, and I felt like I became a better production manager because of their insight and

wisdom."

To collaborate across the country, they wrote the book in two parts – *Hard and Soft Skills* and *Connecting It to the Work* – and divvied up the chapters in each. Gillett started with the fifth chapter, *Meetings*, because "I knew exactly what I wanted to say and it took me about two hours to write." Then she tackled *Communication*, and realized she needed to do research. "Each chapter took me longer to write ... there were so many things that I did not know enough about initially, so I had to do research," she said.

Sheehan, PM at the School of Theatre, Television and Film at San Diego State University, had the opposite experience, struggling at first to find the flow. "My first attempts were tangential and a little rough," he said. "It was my husband that finally got me headed in the right direction, and the writing got better as we moved forward."

"My favorite chapters to write were the *Rock and Roll* chapter and the *Relationships* chapter," he said. "There are no books on rock and roll production management, so all my friends were eager and willing to be interviewed, and that's a great feeling to have."

Asked what's in the book he didn't learn in school, Sheehan said no one taught him about "life/school/work balance" – the last chapter. "I also learned that I really began my relationship-building process while I was in college," he said. "Some of my closest working vendors and clients today are from relationships begun 25 years ago."

Gillett said nothing she learned in school made it into the book. "That's kind of the reason we wrote it. No one taught us how to do this job. We hope this book can provide tools, tips, and inspiration for future production managers."

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# USITT Members Productive at International Thespian Festival

USITT was well represented at the International Thespian Festival in Lincoln, NE, June 20 to 26 sponsored by the Educational Theatre Association (EdTA).

President Mark Shanda and his daughter, Ann Shanda, as well as Elynmarie Kazle and her son, Will Banno Rothman, showcased the Institute for 3,850 delegates who attended from across the country and



worldwide at the University of Nebraska, Lincoln. This included teachers from among EdTA's four new chapters in China.

USITT's display in the Lied Rotunda was very busy with an estimated 100 to 150 students stopping by the table each day to pick up literature about membership, the costume symposium, eSET, upcoming conferences, and everything USITT.

Member educators stopped by to ask questions, get literature for their students, learn more about getting involved with the Institute, and thank the USITT representatives for being at the Festival.

Shanda and Kazle taught workshops designed for teachers. Kazle's was about building a high school stage management program, and Shanda discussed low-cost design and technology activities for the classroom. Kazle was also asked to serve as an adjudicator for the stage management Individual Events.



Shanda and Kazle attended a workshop on diversity and the EdTA Town Hall Meeting (similar to USITT's Annual Membership Meeting but smaller) that included a strategic planning

component.

This is the second year USITT has exhibited at this international festival. Last year, Kazle met with Julie Theobald, executive director of EdTA, and USITT Executive Director David Grindle had ongoing conversations with both Diane Carr of EdTA and Theobald about ways the Institute could collaborate and enrich the Festival's technical offerings. There is interest in USITT participating in judging the Tech Challenge, similar to Tech Olympics, as well as do more technical adjudication and provide more expertise with workshops.

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



# Two Conferences, One Commonality

On behalf of the Institute, I had the pleasure of attending two very different conferences this summer. The first was the Educational Theatre Association's International Thespian Festival, held in Lincoln, Nebraska. With over 3500 high school students in attendance, the week of workshops, auditions, interviews and performances was energy filled. There appears to be no more an appreciative audience than an auditorium filled with high school thespians. The support that they offered their colleagues on stage was palpable; cheering entrances, applauding solos, and rising to their feet to recognize a job well done.

High school productions were featured from locations near and far, coming from some who had worked in fully equipped stage houses with robust production budgets, contrasted by those who produce in infamous gymnatorium or cafetorium spaces with not much more than enthusiasm and drive. During the week, students and teachers alike learned about the Institute's support of the Rigging Safety Initiative (RSI) which offers competitively awarded grants to enable rigging inspections, as well as the opportunity to integrate our developing Essential Skills for Entertainment Technicians (eSET) resources into the classroom. Our Board of Directors as well as the Fellows of the Institute are committed to expanding our outreach into the secondary school market.

The other conference, roughly 10% of the size of the ITF, was the recent North American Theatre Architecture and Engineering Conference (NATEAC) held in New York City at the Roosevelt hotel. Just over 300 architects, engineers, consultants, and industry suppliers gathered together to share information about current building trends, technology advancements, and the challenges of equitably serving the client and the budget. Networking opportunities were paramount, with a steady schedule of mealtime sharing, including a harbor tour, around the city and near the Statue of Liberty, that opened the conference.

Conversations in the event rooms and hotel hallways sometimes featured teams who are currently partnering on construction projects taking advantage of the chance to have some face-to-face time. Occasionally folks who had made mistakes in past architecture projects owned up to their errors, sometimes only after some severe needling from their colleagues, yet all celebrated the continued pursuit to seek improved creative solutions to architectural challenges. Individuals now representing their fourth or fifth company affiliation shared updates on their whereabouts, but worked hard not to advocate the quality of

their current product line, focusing more on the overall issues facing theatre engineering and architecture projects.

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




- St. Louis is the birthplace of the ice cream cone, created at the World's Fair in 1904.
