# Member Spotlight: Jeff Bazemore

Jeff Bazemore, USITT Early Career Member and Props Master at the Philadelphia Theatre Company.

# USITT: How did you get involved in theatre?

Jeff: I got started in high school, and I was an actor. I was a die-hard, active actor. It's what I wanted to do; I bonded best with those people. It was very much an environment that I really latched onto and enjoyed and really wanted to pursue. I went to Berea College in Kentucky for my undergrad,



and I switched my focus from acting to technical. I've stuck with that since then.

### Is that what led to your props career, your involvement in technical theatre?

Very much so. That is the door that opened and shaped me and made me who I am today.

### What first attracted you to prop making?

I pursued acting in my undergrad, but Berea College is a work study college. All of the students have to have an on campus job. I wanted to get into a theatre job because I went to study theatre and I wanted to spend all of my time there. Shan Ayers, the scenic design professor and my advisor at the time, introduced me to props because I always enjoyed the technical and design elements of what was seen on stage. I wanted to get more involved with it. I was a carpenter I learned how to weld. I did some wood working, and then he introduced me to props.

# How did you end up at the Philadelphia Theatre Company? What led to that?

Funny story; Roy Backes, the Director of Production at PTC and a USITT Member, knows Jeff Allen, the production manager at PCPA where I interned. They know each other from the Production Managers Forum. Jeff gave me a great recommendation which led to me being hired. My family is in Delaware, so it's really close to my family and it's an area that I know.

### Can you tell me about your USITT experience?

My mentor, Shan is a big advocate for USITT. My freshman year was 2009, and

he really preached about going to the Annual USITT Conference & Stage Expo. He was just overjoyed with getting students to this conference and the impact it would have on them. I was truly one of those people who went to my first USITT conference and was just blown away by everything I had not known and had never seen before. It was like an amusement park for technical theatre people! That opened the door for me to really want to stay with USITT, make connections, and get involved. Everything from then on, every internship or even job connection that I've gotten, has come through USITT.

# What's the best piece of advice you've received so far as you entered the professional world?

A lot of people just tell me to be me. They tell me that I have a personality that gets along with anyone and it's a pleasure working with people. So, for me it's being positive, upbeat, energetic, likeable; it just makes people want to work with you. Having those characteristics really carries your name across the globe, and people will seek out and want to work with you and give you opportunities just by being yourself.

### Do you have a prop that truly holds a special place in your heart?

We did Suzan-Lori Parks' *The Death of the Last Black Man* at Berea College and one of my big introductions to molding and casting was making a bunch of watermelons that lived on stage in all shapes and all sizes. As an early props person, my go-to was to buy actual watermelons. Not really understanding the creativity of what it means to recreate something, that's not practical. I got to do plaster casts with molding and casting. It was my introduction to say, "OK, this is what I want to pursue" because I thoroughly enjoyed every single process of it. It was one of the most fun projects I've worked on.

### How have your internships shaped how you perform in your career now?

The internship I did dealt with a lot of students who also were interested in technical theatre, so it was understanding what level of expertise they were at and how you could cater to them to get a project done. It was very much being able to deal with your surroundings and knowing how to communicate with everyone directors, designers, your shop, your labor, your students, just anyone.

### Any advice for future technical theatre graduates?

This is more of a generality of technical theatre, but I still consider myself very new, like nowhere near the experience of any other props master that I've met. It's just amazing where your name will take you and how roads and paths will cross in this industry. I've been very fortunate to do that, and USITT has very much been a gateway for me.

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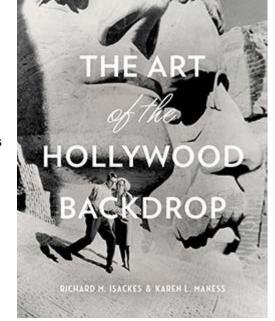

# Karen Maness and the Hidden Lives of Scenic Artists

USITT Board Member Karen Maness' book *The Art of the Hollywood Backdrop* explores the lives of scenic painters who never received recognition for their work.

Karen's fiery passion for divulging these historic details took flight after an idea for a scenic artist session in Long Beach in 2011 during her time as commissioner.



"This book came into my life about 4

and a half years ago and it very much has to do with USITT," Karen said. "Without USITT I don't think the opportunity would have happened for the project."

Karen was able to connect with the president of the Art Director's Guild, Tom Walsh, as well as other scenic artists and things began to take off.

"After the session they approached me and said 'we have been looking for someone to write this book, and it's you!' and I was rather shocked," Karen said.

Because of Karen and her co-author Richard M. Isackes, the lives of many scenic artists have been brought to light.

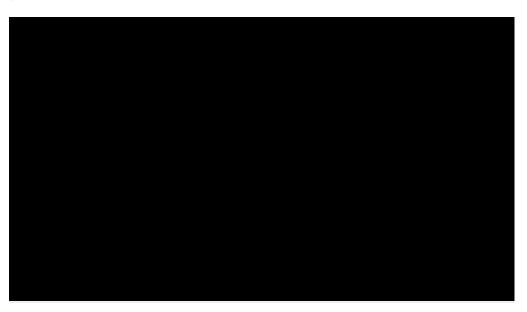
"(I want to) get them recognized and help them have their rightful place in history and I feel very responsible to them all," Karen said. "I hope they've been served well in this book."

"It's a nice downtime to just go and have fun with a bunch of people who do theatre. If you're a professional, it's a feel good thing, you learn and you can also share what you know," Elynmarie said. "If you're somebody who wants to continue to practice your craft but maybe you're no longer teaching or no longer traveling around, it's a great opportunity for you to give back, network, and do some of the projects that make you really feel good."

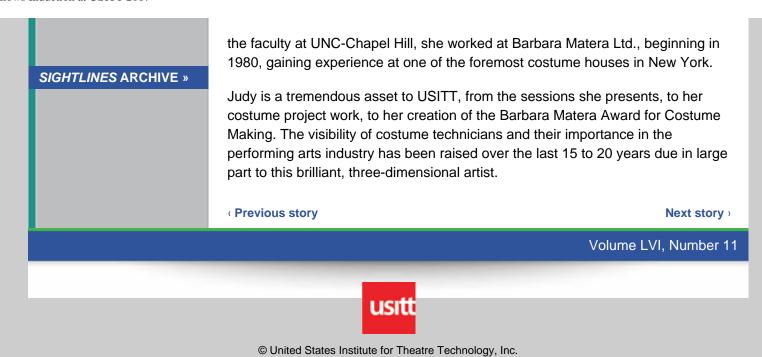

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# News From Mark Shanda, USITT President The Impact Behind the Numbers

In a world that seems to constantly strive for measurable outcomes, ongoing assessments, and metrics that justify investment and decision making, the question of how we measure impact has become critical.

Those of you in the Institute who work in higher education are being bombarded with requests for data to



demonstrate student success and direct links to expected learning outcomes (ELOs) within your curricula. You are being asked, in part, to justify the value of the study of the entertainment industry and live performance as a collegiate experience.

Those of you in the Institute who work in the commercial sector must constantly keep your eye on the bottom line, and justify your return on investment (ROI) on nearly every dollar your business spends. Investment returns are not only measured in financial terms but in time spans that appear to becoming ever shorter as more immediate reward is so strongly desired.

For the leadership of the Institute, how we measure impact focuses on how the various programs and member opportunities we offer align with our mission to "connect performing arts design and technology communities to ensure a vibrant dialogue among practitioners, educators, and students." While the drive for measuring impact appears to push us all toward some numeric value assessment of all that we do, I would like to suggest an alternative way of thinking about how what we do affects others.

While certainly not as easy to capture in a spreadsheet, pie chart, or statistical table, I believe that impact should be measured on a one-to-one, interpersonal basis. We should ask ourselves, "How did our recent production affect an individual audience member? What difference did our sales and service call mean to the arts community with which we worked? What change in practice resulted in the teaching of that last student? What did we each do today that made a difference in the life of another?"

My concern when we try to boil everything down to a numerical value is that we

can easily overlook the human beings involved in the endeavor. The Institute makes choices to invest dollars in research, staff time for educational programs, and expanded avenues to provide volunteer engagement to impact people. The very heart of our organization is to change, challenge, and educate artists and technicians of every age to be their best, to bring an enhanced skill set to their next project, and to find fulfillment in lifelong learning and engagement in production.

As can be seen in the Institute's soon-to-be-delivered annual report, we spent money, invested staff resources, and scheduled events that can be fairly easily counted. But behind all of those numbers is our most important impact: With each endeavor, we made a change in someone's life.

I am proud to be at the head of the table for this remarkable organization and I anticipate that an even greater impact on people lies just ahead with new investments yet to be known.

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# News From **David Grindle**, USITT Executive Director **Creativity = Why Not?**

Sometimes a box set is just that.

Almost every person in theatre has worked on a box set: a few walls, some doors, and usually one or more windows. Box sets can be called one of the staples of scenic design. But recently Barbara de Limberg designed a box set for Seattle Opera that was literally that. Her set for Act I of



Humperdink's Hansel and Gretel has them living in a gigantic cardboard box.

The detail on this was incredible. Everything had been made to scale. The corrugations in the cardboard were there. The old tape marks and a few tape pieces were on the outside. The way the rooms had been made of cardboard had a sag to it, like an old cardboard box.

It's simple in one way, and simply brilliant. It is a box set. Something so common became fascinating because she changed the scale. The fabrication of her design was also part of the mystery of it because she took the time to make sure the shop built every detail of an old box. Joel Adam's lighting design made it all come to life. So why did this set make me want to fly across the country and go to two and half hours of German opera?

They asked "Why not?"

They took an idea that is both simple and ludicrous in the eyes of some and said, "Why not do it?" It fits the production. Director (and costume designer) Laurent Pelly has a very different take on this fairy tale. But the team came together and said, "Why not?" The location of the witch's house is a gigantic candy store. Why not? But the box set, that is the striking image that made me see the risks taken and rewarded.

So much these days, ideas get shut down because of budget or even lack of belief. In our contemporary quarterly capitalism, risk is more dangerous than ever because profit is supposed to show an immediate return. But this production reminded me that creativity and inspiration are our commodities. We must be faithful guardians of the purse, yes, but that can't have us lose sight of the

possibilities that creativity can bring. We are a creative art form after all.

Yes, budgets must be adhered to. But all too often creative ideas are shut down with "we can't afford it." I challenge us all to ask instead, "What are we trying to accomplish artistically and how can we afford it?" To be even riskier, "How can we afford not to?"

Our world is full of creative designers and people who can bring that creativity to reality. I hope you find something that inspires you as much as this production inspired me. I want to create and explore in my own way because I saw the results of their work. That's the beauty of a life in the arts. We build upon the risk, beauty, and inspiration of others, each in our own way. What has inspired you to ask "Why not?" lately?

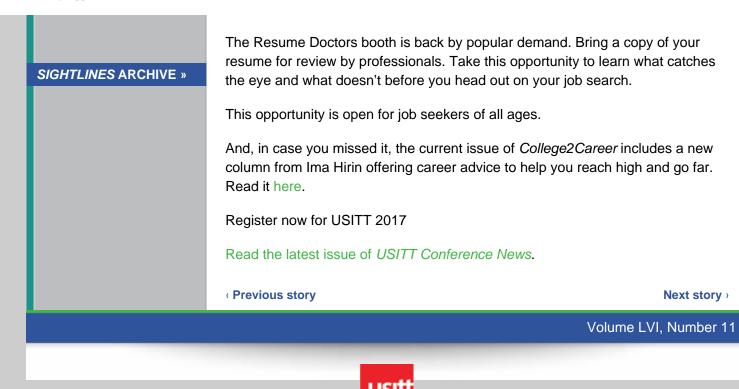
