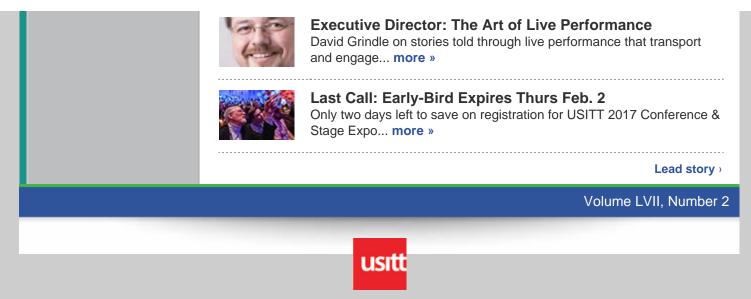

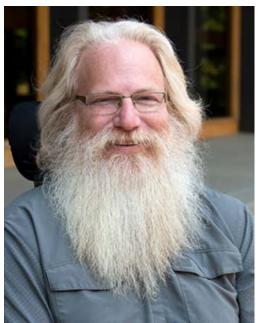

How did you begin your career in lighting design?

In high school theatre I was not cast my sophomore year in the production of *Dracula*, so someone said "Why don't you do some special effects?" and that was the moment where I had an epiphany. I was running an old auto transformer board and pulling bilevers around and I realized at that moment that when I was moving levers, I really wasn't controlling the light as much as I was controlling the emotion of the audience. I decided at

that moment that was what I wanted to do for the rest of my life.

What led you to Oregon Shakespeare Festival?

Its reputation as a place that was producing excellent theatre. A place that had artistic integrity about the work that it was doing and just the quality of the work. Before I came, I was having a discussion with someone about the possibility of someday being good enough to spend maybe the last 10 years of my career at the Oregon Shakespeare Festival and hopefully I would be good enough to do that someday. Sure enough, six weeks later the person I was talking to got an offer to come down and a few months later I got an offer to come down so it worked out really well.

How do you take directors ideas and turn them into a reality?

That is the job really. You're an interpreter of artistic desire and our job is to find a way to manifest those dreams and ideas on stage. You have to be good at understanding the actual artistic intent and you have to understand where the artists are going with the piece and how you can best support it with your technology. When I started doing theatrical lighting you could pretty much get by with just having a crescent wrench and a screw driver. Now you need to be a computer network expert, understand embedded electronics, and have a solid

basis in other kinds of electronics. You just can't get by with the simple stuff to be good at it. I continue learning and growing and riffing off of the ideas of people around me and trying to manifest the best possible work by exploring what's new and what's available.

So would you say you draw inspiration by networking with your peers? Absolutely. We're constantly trying to find a way to bring to fruition these ideas so we're constantly learning and growing together. We're inspiring each other.

Who are some positive influences that you draw from?

Some of the best lighting designers come through the Oregon Shakespeare Festival and I have the extreme pleasure to be able to work with them. A lot of them are a really positive influence on me. I've had the pleasure to work with so many really talented people and feel blessed to be in the same room with those folks.

Tell me about your experience as a USITT Gateway mentor.

I think the biggest takeaway from that experience was that in this business that we're in, especially technical theatre, we tend to attract and retain misfits. That also means that we have a strong community and a strong family and supporting each other as we go through whatever our own individual challenges are is ultimately the most important thing. There's so much excitement and energy from the young people we worked with in the Gateway Program and there's no reason that any of them should be denied the opportunity to excel just because of whatever their disadvantage was. Whether it was socio-economic, race, disability. None of that stuff should be a limit to our ability to succeed in this business. As a disabled person who is able to be successful in the business, I learned that the barriers are not really there. The barriers are only there if you allow them to be.

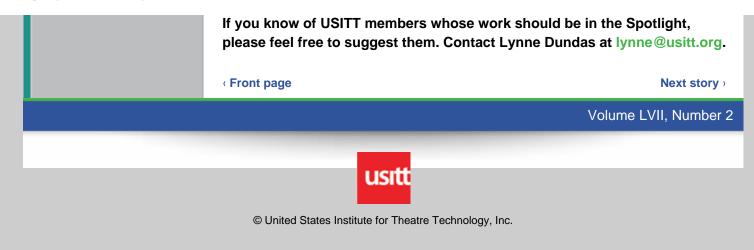
What are some of your favorite productions that you've designed?

There are so many of them. We've done such amazing stuff. I've really been involved in a lot of great productions at Oregon Shakespeare Festival. We did *Equivocation* which ended up touring and we brought it to the Arena in D.C. I assisted Chris Ackralan on that and designed the projections for it. It was an amazing production. I think working at a Shakespeare Festival doing a play about Shakespeare's company might have been a little bit of inside baseball, but was also really pleasing.

How does USITT play a role in your career and personal life?

I think because USITT is organized around education, not only is it a professional organization in which we set standards and try to maintain the best but it really is geared towards the educational environment. There's a constant training ground and mentorship ground so it's all about learning and growing and becoming better at our craft. For myself it's a resource for that, not only for my continued learning and growth but also now that I'm getting a little bit older my opportunity to return what I've received from so many amazing mentors over the years. I'm able to pass on the knowledge that was passed on to me. That's what USITT is about, that constant flow of stagecraft.

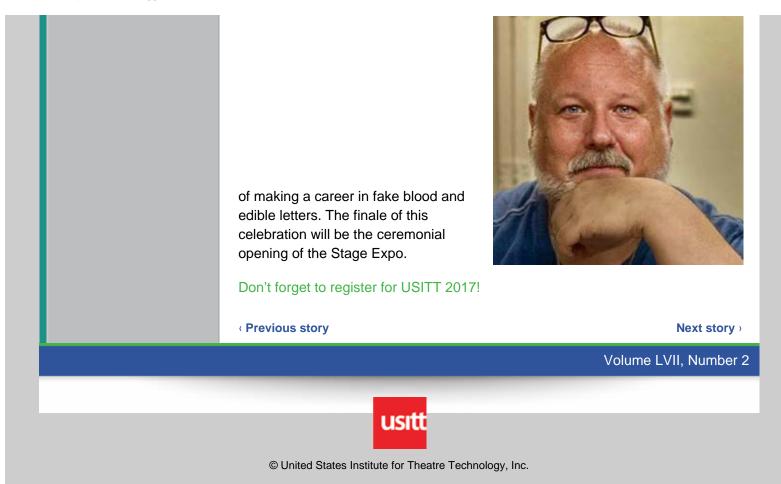

News From Mark Shanda, USITT President The Humbling Tape Mark Shanda USITT President

As an undergraduate student, I was encouraged by my faculty to pursue scenic design. In our only course covering theatre design, I pencil drafted sample flats, drew a ground plan for Neil Simon's *The Prisoner of Second Avenue*, and built a ½" scale model of my scenic design for Peter Shaffer's *The Royal Hunt of the Sun*. My teacher was so impressed with my model that I was instructed to enter it into a design competition sponsored by a large mid-western university. So, I drafted a ground plan of what I had designed, took color photographs of the model, packed up my entry, and shipped it off, expecting nothing but recognition of my greatness.

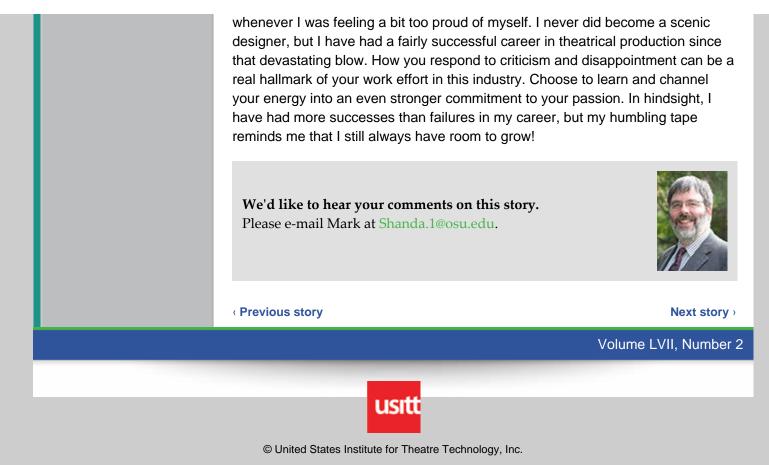
The competition was "blind judged" in that only an entry number was the identifier on each submission. The judges examined the materials in some room on the sponsor's campus while a cassette tape recorder captured their thoughts. The resultant recording was then sent back to each entrant to provide feedback, and as I assumed the most appropriately awarded prize money.

When the padded envelope appeared in my dorm mailbox, I was more than excited. But when I opened it, there was no letter, nor any prize money, just the cassette labeled "ENTRANT NUMBER 1". Thoroughly convinced the prize money must be coming later, I popped in the cassette, cranked the volume, and expected to hear nothing but praise.

The tape began...Entrant Number 1 – *The Royal Hunt of the Sun*...(long pause) and then the first reviewer spoke: "While I have no idea who this student is, nor where they are studying, they are certainly no scenic designer." Reviewer number two: "They obviously know very little about this play and I cannot image whoever taught them to draft!" Things went downhill from there until the last reviewer said, "Well although they are not worthy of any recognition as an artist, they did take a risk."

To say I was crushed was an understatement. How is it possible that I was such a big man on my own campus, a design and technology superstar...and yet these industry professionals declared I was wasting my time? In point of fact they were right. It was not a very good scenic design. I had no research skills, had not conducted any script analysis, and produced scenic elements with only 90° corners and 4'x8' units.

For years, I held onto what I eventually called my "humbling tape," listening to it

News From David Grindle, USITT Executive Director The Art of Live Performance David Grindle Executive Director

There's a long list of productions I wish I had had the chance to see in the past year. Yes, *Hamilton*, but so many more are out there too.

Two in particular have my mind because of the influence of the design on the production. One I mentioned a few months ago, the Seattle Opera production of *Hansel and Gretel*. The other is the New York Theatre Workshop production of *Othello*. These are two vastly differently productions. One, a huge production in grand scale. The other, intimate and close



up. Each featured incredible casting and master works of their genre. But the designs, those were what made me really want to see those shows.

In Seattle, the designer took things and made them larger than life. At the same time, caring to enlarge every detail down to the smallest rip of paper. In New York, everything was stripped down. The room, including the surroundings of the audience, were in plain plywood. Lighting was not a large theatrical plot, as in Seattle. Rather, the lighting designer had to work with available light sources, LED lamps, and other things.

Both of these brought me back to the words of our keynote address at the conference in Salt Lake City. Tupac Martir reminded all of us that the technology we use is the tool to paint the picture for the audience. This is true in every form of design. What we use creates the space, informs the show, and makes the art. The end result changes not only the audience, but the performers and the creative staff and team. We remind ourselves that the story we are telling is the focus.

As I sit here typing this surrounded by electronics and gadgets that make my daily life function, there is a certain irony here that I'm longing to be transported to another place through theatre. But that irony is why each person in our industry continues to work. The idea of sitting in a venue with others, getting absorbed in to the story, and discovering something, be it life changing or simple joy and happiness in a moment, that idea is what keeps our art going. Even in a world where we are focused on screens and immediate response, the art that is created in live performance is what moves us.

As much as any other good techno-nerd, I love nothing more than looking at the

equipment in a space. In fact, my family has come to expect me to focus on what lighting or scenic items are available for closer inspection. I want to see the tools.I want to know what brushes, both literal and figurative, are being used to make the art. However, once the story begins, I want to see the art and not be distracted by the how.

That brings me back to those two shows. Telling a story can be done on any scale. When the artists commit to using their tools like masters we are all transformed. And for that I owe a huge thanks to everyone that has ever been that artist. Thank you for transporting us to another place, for engaging our minds in new ideas, and for showing us that there are far more artists represented in each performance than just the ones you can see.
