Member Spotlight: La Beene

Q&A with costume designer, Utah Valley University assistant professor, and VC for Communications for USITTs Costume Design & Technology Commission, La Beene.

How did you get your start in technical theatre and costume design?

I grew up sewing and doing theatre, so they came together in a very natural way. In high school, if you were the person who sewed you were the person who put together costumes. I honestly didn't realize that you could have a job doing that until I got to college and became involved in the theatre department. Suddenly, I discovered there were people who did that for a living.



Did you have a passion for design growing up?

I was obsessed with the Muppets as a kid. I really wanted to make clothes for Miss Piggy. I thought maybe that was something I could do, but I still didn't realize it was a job. I made a lot of things for Barbie and for dolls, and I grew up in the Molly Ringwald era, so I modified thrift store items so that I could have my own unique look. I did a lot of that, but I didn't have a clue you could apply it to a career in costuming.

How did you become involved in teaching?

When I went to school, I thought I was going to be a high school drama teacher. That was the job that made sense with my skill set. It was a natural evolution as I went through school and got a degree with an emphasis in costume design and technical theatre and went to grad school. I went to grad school specifically because I knew I wanted to teach. Teaching was something that I thought was

always going to be in my stars, and it is.

Do you prefer freelance work or working on shows at the university?

I love doing outside work, but I consider myself a teacher first. I love working with outside students on their productions and having my students assist me on things that I design at the university because it's all part of a learning process. That's the world that I fit into and that my brain likes. It likes training young designers.

Tell me about your role with the Utah Valley University Student Chapter

Two years ago, I had a bunch of students who wanted to know more about USITT and I said, "You know, you can have a Student Chapter." We had a good group of students who put together their charter and had it approved by the school and the national charter, and it's been great.

They're a very active group. They won an award for the most active club on campus last year, and their goal is to educate themselves and find unique opportunities and get themselves to the Conference. They're pretty good at doing that. I help where I can with grants and trying to find money to get them to the Conference, but they're go-getters and they operate independently. When they need me, they come and get me. They're an active group and they're great, excited, and passionate, which is fun.

You've had an extensive career so far. What challenges do you face on a regular basis as a designer?

One of the toughest things is figuring out when you have to say no so that you can do a good job on the things you're committed to. Sometimes there's great opportunities but the timing is bad or you're already committed to other projects. I do say no to projects and am mindful of how much work I take on. Organization is key. Being able to balance the artistic side with the organizational side is important to me. I stress paperwork with my students. You can't mentally keep track of every little piece. Making sure I've got the right organization put in place is particularly important.

When I'm working with the children's theatre, I can regularly have 400 costumes in a show for them because it's such a large cast, and I can't keep track of all of that mentally. Making sure that I keep track of the groups on paper is the only way to keep my sanity.

What is your favorite aspect of design? Do you adhere to a signature style?

I love the research. That's super nerdy, but I love finding the historical connections and the not-super- appreciated details that no one might see. They may not make it onto a costume, but at least I know them.

I love musicals. I like to render in different styles. My work usually doesn't look the same show to show. I like hand painting renderings and computer renderings. Whatever the style is of the production I'm working on, I will adapt my style to fit the show.

How does USITT play a role in your life?

I've been a member for 15 years. When I was in grad school I became a member of USITT, but it hasn't been until the last five years or so that I've really been able to attend the Conference regularly. I love the workshops and being able to connect with people in my field from different areas. Everyone has so much knowledge, and everyone is so generous with their time and knowledge. I've found that I learn so much from being around people at the Conference.

The last three years, I've been able to take students, and it's been great to see them come to the Conference and realize these are their people. They attended the workshops, find internships, and talk to grad schools. Usually every school has maybe one costume designer, so you feel like you're in this world all by yourself. Then you get to the Conference and realize you're part of a much bigger group of people, and it gives you a sense of comradery that there are other people who know what you're going through, what you're dealing with, and what you're trying to learn.

I like the fact that we're all able to connect on Facebook now. If I have a question about something, I don't have to wait for the Conference. I can reach out to these people I've met at the Conference and ask them questions about how they do something at their school and it's awesome. With us starting and re-chartering our section, it's been nice because we have a connection out in these western states, and we have a group of people who are working to provide additional training for our students.

This event is hosted every three years and provides funding to the Grants & Fellowships Program and Kook Fund. Over the years, approximately \$300,000 has been distributed to a variety of grant and fellowship recipients through this funding. These awards have helped sponsor research and technological developments within the entertainment industry.



The Art Auction and Garage Sale is an opportunity to replenish some of the funding that has been provided in recent grant and fellowship awards and takes place near the special exhibits and Network Nexus at Stage Expo.

The silent art auction typically features 20-30 pieces of original artwork (renderings, sketches, other materials related to significant productions, and other items and books of historical significance, such as tour jackets) from members of the Institute and other design professionals throughout the industry. The garage sale features items that are priced and immediately sold as they would be in any other garage sale. Items that have appeared in past garage sales include books, older trade journals, old swatch books, period stage lamps, show posters, unique drafting, and other related equipment and stage items.

If you have a connection who is willing to part with a significant piece of theatre art or other collectible and donate it to the Art Auction, we would love to hear from you.

If you have an old library that you have to retire to the garage or just a couple of books, old trade magazines, posters, or other theatrical memorabilia that you no longer need or want and feel that some of our younger members would benefit from adding them to their collections, we would appreciate your donating them to

the garage sale. All donations to the auction and garage sale are tax deductible.

The Fellows Update

A New Beginning: Life After Retirement

As I always tell everyone as they approach retirement, make sure you know what you are going to retire to and not just from. Well, as I approached my retirement in June 2013, I had to remind myself of that advice and to gauge my own ability to transition from 43 years of teaching, first at Morehead State University, Kentucky - with the majority at the



University of Minnesota — Twin Cities, to a new life without meetings. What has engaged me over the past four years has been time to be freely engaged in many activities; however, at my own pace, agenda, and timeline!

Of course, I have continued to design scenery/properties locally at both Penumbra Theatre and, most recently, at Park Square Theatre in St. Paul-Penumbra. The latter has given me the distinct pleasure of grappling with understanding the African-American voice, with highlights being both Langston Hughes' *Black Nativity* — a Christmas staple — and Lynn Nottage's *By the Way, Meet Vera Stark*. For Park Square, I have created a variety of worlds from the studio of Mark Rothko with RED to the bombed-out interior of the 16th Street Baptist Church in Montgomery, Alabama, in 1963 for a world premiere of Nina Simone: *Four Women*.

For me, designing has always been first and foremost about problem solving. How can I balance a modest budget, a reduced building period into a space with inherent limitations making scene shifts almost impossible? The more difficult the problem, the more I enjoy the work. My early years as a technical director were great groundwork for helping me get the "biggest bang for the theatre's buck."

I also volunteer for a local support group called "The Gathering" that works with folks suffering from dementia leading to Alzheimer's. This outlet provides a great way of giving back and perhaps paying forward with a growing problem that's going to be a tsunami of graying America. Although we work to create engaging programming for the participants, our bigger agenda is to provide time for the overwhelmed caregivers.

To exercise my teaching skills, I provide classes in drawing and rendering for

older students at my church. Most have completed careers but have always wanted to exercise their artistic muscle. I must admit that every once and a while, my old sayings perfected over those decades of classrooms slip out like, "The darks define the light," or, "Your first line is going to be wrong — get over it!" This past June, I was asked to do a workshop on *Scene Painting: The Historical Method* at the U. We started out with viewing historical sketches from the **University Archives**, followed by two days of frame painting from a historical perspective that was perfected at the U. along with 20 years of teaching at Cobalt Studios.

Through all of this, I have been fortunate to join contemporary Fellow Dick Durst on several international travel adventures. These yearly sojourns have enriched my understanding of what I probably should have been teaching all those years. So, to answer my initial question, I have transitioned to a life of adventure and challenge, but I also must admit, I do miss the classroom and students.

The Green Scene

Dathan Powell Assistant Professor of Theatre, University of Illinois

For this month's installment of the Green Scene, we are looking at ways in which theatres can collaborate with other entities on their campuses or in their communities to become the hubs for sustainable innovation.

One example of such a relationship can be found at Franklin College, just 20 minutes outside of Indianapolis in Franklin, Indiana. At this liberal arts institution of more than 1,000



students, partnerships have been forged between the college and a national climate leadership organization called Second Nature. That connection, in turn, has resulted in collaboration between the Theatre Department and the physical plant.

Tom Patz, the director of facilities and energy management at Franklin University, working without the benefit of a full-time sustainability officer, relies on student interns to assist in tracking utility usage in the effort of reducing the campus's carbon footprint. These interns then contacted Gordon Strain, associate professor and the chair of theatre, to study the kWh consumed by the department's theatrical lighting.

While efforts to quantify and compare such usage between conventional incandescent fixtures and modern fixtures have yielded results that were not as divergent as had been hoped with the advent of LEDs, this practice still exemplifies how partnerships that produce awareness at the local level can benefit the larger institutions that surround. Attention to the Theatre Department's electrical consumption, as one part of the larger picture, could inform the college on where purchasing LEDs for the campus at large made the most impact.

Another benefit of this collaboration is the awareness that it created for its participants. Professor Strain began thinking about the way the black box theatre consumed energy through its heating and cooling. For large portions of the semester, the room would be empty but would still be climate controlled as though it were occupied. By directing the physical plant to only the times when heating and cooling for audience and student comfort were necessary, the department helped cut energy consumption and costs for the college.

Innovation Grant Winners



USITT is pleased to announce the winners of the USITT Innovation Grants for 2017: Ian Garrett and Jonathan Allender-Zivic.

The Innovation Grants are a commitment from USITT to invest in research that will move our industry forward. Each cycle offers up to \$110,000 of research funding to explore ideas that will adapt current technology for entertainment use or will create new technology for our industry. These new and innovative proposals will address technology challenges faced by the entertainment industry.

The focus of lan's research will be: *Emerging Immersive Technology to Time-Shift Live Performance with Augmented and Virtual Reality*. The project proposes that these technologies are more aligned with theatre-making than other artistic disciplines and that theatre makers are readily equipped to lead innovation using them in storytelling.

lan is Assistant Professor of Ecological Design for Performance at York University, director of the Center for Sustainable Practice in the Arts, and a trustee for DanceUSA. He is a designer, producer, researcher, and the resident designer for the Indy Convergence, an international arts accelerator and pop-up residency based in Indianapolis.

For his study, Jonathan will research: 1/2" Scale Previsualization Model Box for Media, Lighting and Scenery. The project is designed to bring projection and digital technologies together in a lab-type environment and to provide educators with a cost-efficient means of training for students in these technologies.

Jonathan is an Assistant Professor of Theatre at the University of South Dakota, teaching lighting design, sound design, and stage management. Jonathan has been working both academically and professionally for more than 15 years.

With these grants, the Board of Directors hopes to see greater impact for the

industry than ever before.

"The Innovation Grants program not only raises the amount of funding available for distribution and ultimately for greater impact, but we hope it will also increase the stream of research projects over multiple years," said USITT President Mark Shanda. "These grants will allow for larger strides to be made in areas like safety or sustainability and energy savings and could even lead to new partnerships for the industry."

This new funding initiative is a yet another return on the investments made by the Institute's membership and by generous donors. Continued support from members and donors will help USITT to support and expand its mission, ensuring the positive impact of the organization for practitioners, educators, and students in the theatre and entertainment industry well into the future.

Rob was the consummate theatre professional. He died Tuesday evening, October 3, before opening night. His funeral service was held Saturday, October 7, at 2 p.m. so as not to interfere with Saturday night's performance or the strike on Sunday afternoon.



Rob lived in many worlds: his theatre world, his scouting world, and, for the past decade, his bicycle world. He loved them all. Most of all, he loved his family. He leaves behind his wife, Liz, his son, John, daughter-in-law, Evie (the daughter he never had), and granddaughter, Ruby. He was so proud of them.

A native New Yorker, Rob came to Springfield, Missouri, in 1991 to teach at Drury University, then Drury College, where there was a small theatre program with a big heart. The shows they produced were outstanding. Slowly, the theatre department began to grow. In 1999, Rob designed the Studio Theatre in Springfield Hall. The department continued to expand. Not only were there more students but also more faculty.

In 2016, the department moved to the Drury Univ. Mabee Performing Arts Center and was in need of a new black box theater. Once again, Rob designed a

theatre. With the help of Judy Thompson in development, Rob helped fundraise for a new black box theatre. The theatre will be dedicated this spring with a production of *The Fantasticks* that Rob planned to direct and design. Fortunately, the design is complete and the plan is to use it for the production.

Rob wrote a book on directing based on his more than 40 years as a director. His book, *The Director's Toolkit*, will be released in January. It is filled with stories and pictures from his work at Drury.

Life is short, but as everyone in theatre knows, the show must go on. He would want his family, friends, current and former students, all of whom he considered family, to go on and know how much he loved them.





Thoughts from David Grindle USITT Executive Director Working as an Industry to be Prepared

I was in grad school the first time I encountered claims of a non-prop weapon seen in the theatre. We were doing a production of the opera *Nixon in China*, and someone reported seeing what they believed to be a firearm tucked in someone's belt in the restroom. No description of the alleged person could be given, and it was decided by the faculty that we would continue. We were doing a show where the lead was portraying an unpopular former U.S. president. I'm reasonably sure we were all nervous that evening.



entertainment can and will be a soft target for people wanting to do harm.



We as an industry work to be prepared. We have backup plans for when something goes wrong in our shows. We have all had to improvise stage directions when a performer skipped a few lines or figure out what to do when a double click happens accidentally on a control board. We work to be prepared.

The horrible shooting in Las Vegas on October 1 brought up the discussion of preparedness. The role of USITT is to facilitate discussion about how to be prepared and safe working in an entertainment environment. The need for a plan isn't just for horrible, unthinkable events like we saw. It is for weather, unrest, structural failure, or medical emergency. We as professionals must be ready to adapt in emergencies. While many among us are prepared, we must all be vigilant and willing to discuss and learn more about these situations.

While we are engaging these topics at the Conference in Fort Lauderdale, we all should be engaging those around us today in conversation and planning. We must work to understand the best procedures for our staff and patrons when something horrible happens. And if we have learned anything in the past 20



years, it is that the unthinkable will happen at some point. The question we must be prepared for is how do we think we will react? What is our plan and how will we respond?

In 2014, as Stage Expo was opening in Fort Worth, a line of spring storms with potential tornadoes was bearing down on the city. We gathered the USITT Conference leadership together with the Convention Center leadership to discuss appropriate spaces should we need to move people to safety. The convention center had a plan and they looped us in. The storms split and we didn't need to activate the plan, but it was great to have partners that were prepared.

In Cincinnati in 2015, our attendees engaged in an emergency plan being activated, as that was the year we had a fire alarm go off and we had to evacuate the building. The USITT Conference team all worked together to clear the space and then get folks back in safely. I would like to tell you that it was because we had rehearsed what would happen, but it was because everyone, from attendee to Executive Director, worked together and communicated because we were professionals that respected safety. That year it was a false alarm. But the response of everyone gave me hope for the day when it may not be.

If you would like to read some interesting articles on safety, check out the Fall 2016 issue of *TD&T*. Check with your employer to see if emergency action plans exist. If they do, take a moment to read them. Where such plans don't exist, encourage their creation. If you are able to join us in Fort Lauderdale, we want you to be part of the conversation. If you can't be there, I encourage you to engage in the conversation where you are and with your network. Emergency preparedness is part of our lives. Let's embrace it and learn from one another.
