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

Q&A with Maranda DeBusk

How did you get your start in lighting design?

When I was younger, my family moved across the country a few times, and I started falling into theatre departments in high school because they were always really welcoming. One day someone mentioned that they needed a light board operator for a show, and I said, "Well, I've never done that before." And here we are. I started designing for productions when I was an undergrad at Furman University, I worked as an electrician and assistant at local theatres throughout college, and I started designing professionally the summer after I graduated.



Tell me about the difference between lighting design and projection design

It's difficult to describe the differences between projection and lighting design. They've become very intertwined for me. They both affect the audience's perception of the location, emotion, and flow of a piece. I think the greatest difference is that projection design bridges the gap between scenic and lighting designs. Often in a more direct way, projections can influence the world that we've created, and sometimes can affect the mood or action of a piece in a more literal way than lighting can.

What I find very interesting is that everyone approaches projection design differently. Lighting designers from a lighting perspective, scenic designers from a scenic perspective, sound designers from a sound perspective and so forth. It's such a young field that we're all still figuring it out. It's like the wild west of theatre. There are no rules.

Tell me about your USITT Barbizon Lighting Design Award win

I was so excited when I won. It's such an honor to have been selected. There are so many talented young lighting designers in the country, and to know that there was something about my work that stood out to the selection committee and the Institute is a major confidence boost. The cash prize has been helpful as it was half the cost of my Vectorworks license when I upgraded to a professional version. It was the core of what helped further my career. Getting to meet Jonathan Resnick was very important, and he was such a great guy. I spent an afternoon with him, and he changed my life in a lot of ways. I'm so thankful to have had that opportunity.

Tell me about your involvement with World Stage Design in 2017

I got to exhibit in Taipei, Taiwan this past summer as one of 15 emerging lighting designers worldwide which was crazy. It was an incredible opportunity to meet people from all around the world who do what I do. I often think of the theatre I do every day as the theatre in my region, and sometimes I think about the theatre of my country, but to spend a full week thinking of theatre as our world is a different perspective. It really unites us and opens doors to new and different ways of looking at our art. It was a great learning experience and fascinating to see.

What is your design style?

I like to think that the style depends on the piece that we're putting together, and the people we're putting it together for. My favorite type of theatre to do is Theatre for Social Change. Things with a social justice message that involve communities. But the style of that piece might be simpler than a rock musical. It just depends. In general as far as aesthetic style goes, I love big bold choices in color and texture. It's not right for every piece, but I love the way it feels when it is right.

What is an important lesson you've learned throughout your education and career?

"There are no rights or wrongs. There are only choices and consequences." I riff off that every day. To me it says that there's nothing I can do that's going to make this building explode. There's no button I can push, there's no content I can put out there, and there's no angle, color, or texture that I can choose that's going to cause incredible and irrevocable harm, so I should try it. If it doesn't work, it doesn't work, and then you try something else.

How has USITT played a role in your life?

I got started with USITT in 2011. I was a sophomore in undergrad and I had gotten a grant from my university to go to the Conference to see what there was to see. I was young and had no idea what I was doing, and I showed up with eight 8x10 photos of a show I had done for my Cover the Walls exhibit. No name, information, and nothing that was nearly as incredible as some of the Cover the Wall exhibitions are. I remember tacking up my photos, looking at everything around me, and thinking, "Man, maybe I did this wrong."

Then I was walking around the Expo, and I saw all these amazing things and all of these amazing people who make what I love to do happen and who have

found they love to do it, too.

It was through USITT that I met Brackley Frayer who got me involved in community performance and Theatre for Social Change. It was through USITT that I learned how vast our world could be.

Being a part of the Young Designers' Forum in 2017 reminded me of being that little upstart in 2011, tacking up those photos and thinking how cool everything was. Looking back, I could see the growth. I knew people and things, and I felt like I was a part of something, which, at the end of the day, is part of why I started doing what I do from the very beginning.

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News & Notices Rigging Safety Grants – Fall 2017

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USITT has approved funding for stage rigging inspections and safety training at no cost for 10 additional schools as part of its Rigging Safety Initiative (RSI). The Rigging Safety Initiative is sponsored by H&H Specialties, ETC, and JR Clancy.

RSI has approved applications from more than 100 schools spanning across 25 states since its start in




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2011. Schools can apply for the free inspections twice a year, in spring & fall. A USITT panel of rigging experts determines when applicants are approved based on need, safety concerns, and the amount of funding available.



The unique asymmetrical and democratic seating arrangement of the Thrust Theatre creates a feeling of intimacy, but also self-awareness; the entire room lends itself to creative, immersive staging. The psychology of the room is enhanced by natural light that floods the space during daytime; but the room can be darkened at any time by automated blackout shades that cover the windows of the serpentine curtain wall. During daytime the theatre is used as an instructional space that accommodates large enrollments and the infusion of natural light into the theatre space enlivens the dynamic of the room.

Simplicity, clean design, and a clear positioning were at the forefront when creating the new look.


"It has been significantly altered to better reflect how we engage with media now online and in print," Eileen said.

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distributed to a variety of grant and fellowship recipients through this funding.



The Prague Quadrennial traveling exhibit, also known as PQ Jr., is now being shown at Kent State University in its Performing Arts Library. The exhibit is on display now until April 5.

The photographs and videos in the



exhibition are from USITT's exhibition at the 2015 quadrennial, which was installed in the 14th century Church of Saint Anne and was visited by 180,000 people.

Designed by Klara Zieglerova, with lighting design by Kevin Rigdon, the exhibition was guided by the quadrennial's theme of weather, evoking the most American of meteorological phenomena: a tornado.

The iPads in this exhibit include images, video, and interviews that encourage visitor engagement in multiple ways with the featured productions. Thirty professional designs were on display, along with examples of work from the Student Exhibition.

The manner in which we offer them is where we try to focus our energies. Our membership committee is beginning to evaluate our membership types and benefits to insure we have the proper structure for the people we serve. But now I strongly believe that the conversation on benefits can focus on the more abstract things like learning and connections because those are the core of what we want to offer. How we offer or convey those benefits, those are the features such as Conference, *Theatre Design & Technology*, or one of our non-conference educational opportunities.

I hope that the new light this course shined on benefits for me will help me help the committee see their charge in a new perspective. We know the benefits of USITT, they've honestly not changed in 58 years. The features by which we convey those benefits, that's what we want to focus on. Because learning, networking, and collaborating have been at the heart of this organization since its founding. So as we move forward we are all committed to focusing on the benefits while we work to insure the features are meeting the needs of people in our world today. Features can be updated, but thanks to our founders and predecessors for developing benefits at that are ever relevant.

While visiting my wife's parents over the holidays, we spent some time going through old family papers to continue to learn more about our past and to find new genealogical connections. One treasure that we unearthed was the program for a May 13, 1938, production of *The Adventures of Robin Hood* by Owen Davis that was presented by the "Dramatic Department and Sponsored by the Senior Class" of Perry High School in Perry, Iowa. In this undoubtedly landmark production, the role of *Little John*, described in the program as "Robin's right hand man," was played by my wife's uncle, Donald Christisen. With this discovery, I felt a new sense of kinship to Uncle Donald, because I had once played Little John in my fourth-grade class production of *Robin Hood*. However, this wasn't the best find in this historic program.


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Following the cast list of the 33 students involved, a detailed "synopsis of scenes" for the three acts, and a listing of the "Musical Program" being provided by the "Social Orchestra" of the school, the next part of the program that caught my eye identified two additional groups of students: the "Stage Force" and the "Property Force." While in my heart of hearts, I firmly believe that nearly every successful production relies on the design and technical talents of many who would never wish to appear on stage, I had never heard of them referred to as "Forces."

The 15 students listed in the two *forces* were no doubt integral members of the production team, and although I did not recognize any names as past or current members of USITT, I could imagine that that these students were kindred spirits with all of us in the Institute. Despite the cutback in the arts that we have seen in so many places, thousands of students each year are introduced to the love of live performance through a locally produced school play. And as each unique student production team is assembled, there is a bond that can take root to both the art form and to the collaborative strength of all involved.

Wouldn't it be great if we could resurrect the group titles of "Stage Force" and "Property Force" in place of stage and props crew. Or better yet, have these groups of talented technicians recognized for the true force for production that they represent, rather than be relegated to sometimes being referred to as "techies." While those of us who work daily in the educational or commercial realms of live entertainment can easily look down on these amateur school plays, many of us got our start in such an environment.


