2004 Costume Symposium

Travel to historic Mary Washington College in beautiful Fredericksburg, Virginia for an intensive three-day program designed to strengthen participants' teaching methods in costume curriculums. For each costume subject area, participants will develop or strengthen teaching strategies used to meet the specific challenges of technology in an academic environment.



The Woodard Campus Center Center at Mary Washington College will be the site for Costume Symposium sessions.

Working sessions will cover specific class disciplines, defining challenges relevant to costume courses, and exploring solutions. Participants will share successful teaching strategies. Symposium Coordinator Kevin McCluskey and an expert presenter will moderate each session.

SPECIAL DAY TRIP

Visit Richmond, Virginia for a curatorled tour of the Valentine Museum's costume and textile collection, plus tour the Virginia Museum of Fine Arts with its excellent collection of Faberge eggs and related ephemera, as well as exquisite Art Deco and Art Nouveau furnishings and accessories.

a reception at the James Monroe Presidential Museum in Fredericksburg will feature mid-19th century clothing, jewelry, and shoes from the Monroe family.

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Costume construction skills are costume construction skills, regardless of degree level. However, there *are* specific challenges imposed on each costume course by its focus. It is not always immediately clear how best to meet those challenges. The symposium will identify common threads, determine differences, and decide where the parallels — if any — may be drawn between degree structures.

An **introductory session** will define both general and specific challenges relating to different degree structures.

Specific sessions will focus on different costume areas. Among the questions to be considered in each content area might be:

- What texts and exercises do participants find useful?
- What skills does an undergraduate or graduate student need?
- What is the most effective structure if the course is only one semester?
- What changes during a two-semester sequence?
- How does content change between undergraduate and graduate courses?

SESSIONS INCLUDE:

Teaching Costume Construction – all of the above plus: How might costume design be included? Is this the only venue to teach patterning?

Teaching Costume Design – all of the above plus: How to structure beginning and advanced formats? How might one structure costume design as part of a theatrical design class?

Teaching Costume History – all of the above plus: Should this be part of costume design or construction if a separate course is not offered? What visual resources have been most helpful?

Teaching Make-up Design – all of the above plus: How might make-up design be structured as a component of a stage technology class?

Teaching a Catch-All Costume Class – How to develop content for a single costume offering? What can be taught?

NOTES:

Participants will receive an outline of the symposium's format. They will be asked to submit specific questions which will be given to the moderators and participants to enhance discussion.

Participants are encouraged to bring materials they use in class. These will be shared in sessions. Electronic notetaking and sharing are also highly encouraged.

A CD-ROM of all symposium materials will be created and distributed to participants after the conclusion of the event.
