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New Database Assists with Play Production Info

A new web-based resource has been launched, geared toward costume designers but replete with information for directors and other members of the production team.

The new web site is Production Requirements, a costume plot database, and it can be found at <u>www.costumeplotdatabase.com</u>. Sponsored by a grant from the USITT Commissioner's Fund, the website is a database of information about plays searchable by several different parameters including title, playwright, period, genre, cast size, and number of costumes.

If a designer doesn't have any particular specifications in mind, the user can browse the database and sort the information by date added, frequency of reference, title, playwright, year published, period, and genre. Each play has a page dedicated to it which contains more detailed information such as a basic plot description, a specific character breakdown, quick change notes, and any special costuming considerations dictated by the script.

Best of all, the database has the capacity to expand and grow as visitors submit information about productions they have done or studied. Submissions can be made by fax or e-mail. Three Standards Under Review

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Three draft standards have been added to those currently available for public review on the ESTA web site at www.esta.org/tsp/documents/public_review_docs.php.

BSR E1.23, Entertainment Technology-Design and Execution of Theatrical Fog Effects, is modeled after the well-respected NFPA standards for indoor pyrotechnics and flame effects and is expected to do the same for fog effects. Review on this document runs through December 27, 2005

BSR E1.25, Recommended Basic Conditions for Measuring the Photometric Output of Stage and Studio Luminaires by Measuring Illumination Levels Produced on a Planar Surface, describes the basic testing conditions for methods of measuring output on a flat wall and the levels of illumination produced. The major changes since the last public review concern lamp calibration and power supply stability. The review runs through January 3, 2006.

BSR E1.27-1, Entertainment Technology-Standard for Portable Control Cables for Use with USITT DMX512/1990 and E1.11 (DMX512-A) Products, is a draft standard that would standardize the wiring of a DMX512 cable and require labeling so single-pair and dual-pair cables can be distinguished from each other. January 3, 2006 is the review deadline.

Selected for their breadth and depth of knowledge, the SMEs will work closely with the Council's selected psychometric services provider, Applied Measurement Professionals (AMP), to develop the examinations.

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The SMEs are: Rick Baxter, Eric Bouchard, Jeanette Farmer, Ian Foulds, David Hatch, John Huntington, Tony Giovannetti, Dave Loftin, Jim Maloney, Alan Rowe, Nancy Shaw, and Ken Vannice.

The SMEs' first task is to develop a job task analysis survey which will be sent to hundreds of entertainment electricians in the U.S. and Canada. The results of this survey will be used to determine the content areas of the examination. The next step in the test development process will be to write the examination questions, which will take place over a series of meetings to be held through the first half of 2006.

As part of the vital job analysis process, entertainment electricians are asked to participate in the survey.

Call for Entertainment Electricians

Job analysis is the foundation upon which to build a viable and rigorous certification examination. The job analysis will focus on analyzing electrical tasks based on importance, time spent, and consequence of error.

ETCP needs help to ensure that the examination reflects the job requirements. The judgments of those taking the survey will assist the SMEs in developing the examination specifications. As many as 20 presenters will stand beside their posters at the 2006 USITT Conference & Stage Expo in Louisville to illustrate an innovative or imaginative design or construction technique, a solution to a problem, a classroom or management technique, the results of research, or other ideas, discoveries, or developments in the field of costuming.

You can be part of this session. Just send an idea, and let the Costume Poster Selection Committee decide. Each submission will be juried by committee members Debra Krajec, chair and past Costume Design & Technology Commissioner; Gwen Nagle, past committee chair; Betty Blyholder, first chair and originator of the Poster session; Donna Meester; and Joel Ebarb.

Ideas should be submitted in the form of an abstract, typewritten, and no more than 200 words. Mail, e-mail, or fax abstracts by January 31 to Ms. Krajec. For answers to questions or an official rules document, contact Ms. Krajec.

Posters should be no smaller than 2-by-3 feet and no larger than 4-by-6 feet. They should be designed to be mounted on the wall or to stand on a table. Some table space in front of each poster for displaying realized projects and handouts may be available. Posters may be in several sections for easy transport. Posters should be easily readable from at least six feet away. Each presenter should prepare a summary handout to distribute. This session usually receives an average of 200 to 250 people attending.

Poster presentations are widely accepted as meeting the requirements for scholarly publication. An educational institution may fund some or all expenses to the USITT Annual Conference & Stage Expo in Louisville. Poster presenters may also have the opportunity to publish their ideas in TD&T.

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Design Session to Focus on *Hamlet*

The success of *Developing the Costume Design Idea* at the 2005 Annual Conference & Stage Expo in Toronto has led to encore in Louisville in 2006, *Developing the Costume Design Idea*, *Take 2*!

Join Gweneth West of the University of Virginia in welcoming returning working professional costume designers and master teachers Laura Crow of the University of Connecticut, Marianne Custer of the University of Tennessee at Knoxville, and Susan Tsu of Carnegie Mellon University. A new addition to the team is Linda Roethke of Northwestern University. These women will share their unique creative process from initial inspiration to sketch in preparation for an exploration of Shakespeare's *Hamlet*.

Yes, it's Hamlet!

Think of this session as an initial design meeting. You are both designer and director. Reread Shakespeare's text, even if you think that you remember it. Or read it for the first time. Jot down thoughts about the world of the play, its characters, and their relationships to each other. Begin to translate those thoughts to visual images. Look for images that are more emotional than literal, that create a sense of the milieu.

These may be tear sheets from contemporary magazines, photocopies of photographs or paintings. Spend a bit of time gathering some images of who these people are and how they might connect to a contemporary audience. At the beginning of the session, these will be posted to share.

Bring a love of the play and its characters, initial inspirations to share, and sketching materials. Once participants have a chance to get to know the team of designers, they will break into working groups to explore the play through the sharing of images and discovery of character and character relationships. The session will wrap up with an opportunity to share work with the group.

This time, the event will be a double session so participants will have plenty of time to work together. The first session begins on Saturday morning April 1 at 10 a.m. At 11:30 a.m. there will be a short break, and the session will continue at noon wrapping up at 1:30 p.m.

A special double session from the Costume Design & Technology Commission will help participants look at a classic play in a new way. Plan now to be part of Developing the Costume Design Idea, Take 2.

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Getting Around Downtown Louisville

For those attending the 2006 USITT Conference & Stage Expo in Louisville, Kentucky, getting from hotels to meetings, out to restaurants, and back again will be a piece of cake.

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The Louisville Marriott Downtown is right across the street from the Kentucky International Convention Center, which is only three blocks from the Galt House Hotel and Suites (see map here, but it may take a few moments to load). And, if it happens to be raining, all three are connected by an indoor pedway.

The headquarters hotel for the 2006 USITT Conference & Stage Expo is the brand new Louisville Marriott Downtown; its grand opening was in July of 2005. The 591 guest rooms and 25 suites feature all the amenities one expects in a first-class hotel: oversized work desks, two-line phones with modem lines, voice mail, irons and ironing boards, coffeemakers, and down-filled duvets. For those bringing cars or vans, valet parking is \$20 per day.

Several conference events will be in the Louisville Marriott Downtown which has 50,000 square feet of meeting space. The Fellows Address and Reception, as well as presentation of the Young Designers & Technicians Awards, will be in the Marriott Ballroom on Thursday at 6:15 p.m., followed at 8 p.m. by the popular New Products Showcase.

The Sound Commission will have a large room all to itself where equipment can be set up for designers to share their aural masterpieces. The Theatre Conference Employment Service will also be in the Marriott, as will ESTA's working groups and sessions.

The other conference hotel is the Galt House Hotel and Suites. This landmark hotel, which has had three locations since it was first built in 1835, has enjoyed its Ohio River overlook since 1972. The Galt House is Kentucky's largest hotel with over 1,300 rooms, including 600 suites of which 12 are impressive two-bedroom suites.

Reservations at a discounted rate in the USITT block can be made easily, either online or by downloading a housing form.

Two other downtown locations which everyone will want to visit, the Kentucky Center for the Arts and Actors Theatre of Louisville, are also within easy walking distance. On Wednesday morning, the Keynote, Kickoff Event, and Annual General Meeting will be held in the Kentucky Center's newly redecorated Whitney Hall.

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Stage Expo Keeps Growing and Growing

When the Board of Directors meets each spring and fall, the Board Report includes a Stage Expo exhibit space sales report. Looking back at the past 20 years of Stage Expo, the steady growth of the show is evident.

From Oakland in 1986 to Toronto in 2005, the number of exhibitors grew 73 percent and the square feet of exhibit space sold increased by 53 percent. One of the reasons for the extraordinary growth in the number of exhibitors is the advent of the commercial and noncommercial tables.

The handful of tables which started out lining a hallway at the conference have become an integral part of Stage Expo, with more than 50 colleges and universities represented each year. Some colleges take two tables to promote their programs, while others step up to a booth to maximize their display space.

A recent trend is for some booth exhibitors to select an exhibit space location in close proximity to the tables, since they recognize the importance of the educational market for their products.
