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

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Monograph, Special Session **To Honor Tharon Musser**


A special part of the Lighting Commission programming at the 2007 Conference & Stage Expo in Phoenix is a celebration of the career of Tharon Musser and the publication of the third USITT Designer Monograph: The Designs of Tharon Musser.

A panel of Ms. Musser's assistants will discuss her Broadway and regional lighting career. Featured panelists will include (schedules permitting): Betsy Adams, Ken Billington, Rick Belzer, Kirk Bookman, Douglas Cox, Jeff Davis, Fred Hancock, Jo Mayer, Marilyn Rennagel, David Segal, Kendall Smith, and Anne Sullivan. All of Ms. Musser's assistants collaborated with Del Unruh on the production of the monograph on her work. The session will be hosted by Craig Wolf and moderated by Mr. Unruh.

Ms. Musser's remarkable professional career lasted from 1956 to 1999 and included 117 Broadway productions among which were: A Long Day's Journey Into Night, Mame, The Odd Couple, Follies, A Chorus Line (including the 2006 revival which used her original designs adapted by Natasha Katz), A Little Night Music, The Wiz, Brighton Beach Memoirs, 42nd Street, and Dreamgirls.

In addition to her Broadway career, she designed throughout the United States for regional companies such as the American Shakespeare Festival, the National Repertory Theatre, The Mark Taper Forum, the Dallas Opera, and the Miami Opera.

The session will be a free wheeling discussion with ample time for questions. After the session concludes, the panelists and Mr. Unruh will sign copies of the monograph in the USITT booth at Stage Expo. Copies of The Designs of Tharon Musser will be sold at the USITT Boutique and will then be available through the USITT online bookstore. The Lighting Commission will host a reception beginning at 7:45 p.m. that Friday which will continue the celebration of Ms. Musser's achievements

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In Memoriam: Erik Magnuson

Eric Magnuson, President of MAGNUM Companies Ltd., of Atlanta Georgia, and Franconia, New Hampshire, died suddenly on November 30, 2006. He was 55.

Mr. Magnuson was born in New Bedford, Massachusetts, graduated from Lawrence High School in Falmouth, Massachusetts with Honors, and earned a degree in classical archeology at New York University. After college he moved to Atlanta to work on a documentary film and then on theater set construction, later becoming a technical director at the Alliance Theater.

In 1979, he met his wife Linda and they co-founded MAGNUM which grew from an operation in their home to a full service production company, specializing in school, theater and museum lighting with a significant interest in producing events and corporate productions. Mr. Magnuson and MAGNUM have been members of USITT since 1982.

As his career and MAGNUM developed, the company grew to 16 full-time employees. Most recently Mr. Magnuson did the lighting design for the Mammoth Caves in Kentucky and the Pottery Museum in Sautee, Georgia. His work was also seen at Atlantaarea theatre company productions, corporate events, and fundraising occasions.

He was valued member of the Entertainment Services & Technology Association (ESTA), serving as Secretary since 1989. He always believed strongly in giving back to his community, and served as the first chairman of the Georgia Shakespeare Festival board. In 1998 he received the Atlanta Chapter of International Special Events Society's Dale Riggins Humanitarian award.

Mr. Magnuson was probably best known for his personal enthusiastic nature and his generosity towards other people. Most people in the business who have moved to the Southeast soon became known to him on a personal basis. He knew who everyone was, what they did, and could easily strike up a conversation despite month-long gaps.

Said former Lighting Commissioner Rich Dunham, "My last conversation with him was in Louisville where we ran into one another somewhere on the Expo floor. Like always, he was quick

	to drop whatever materials he had as we started to sketch out some paperwork or he offered some advice or services to us (USITT) through his role in both ESTA and MAGNUM.
	"This continued generosity followed him throughout his career. Numerous charities and even the early days of the Georgia Shakespeare Festival were recipients of his donations of time and equipment –at times only covering the costs of the labor that he provided for some of these events.
	"He was also quick to offer training seminars and workshops to students and others who were relatively new to the profession –to the point of personally sponsoring these activities at his business and hiring especially interested students as apprentices. He will be fondly remembered and deeply missed by many of us."
	Mr. Magnuson is survived by his wife, Linda; daughter, Ingrid; stepson Todd Finch; sister, Pamela; and brothers Peter, Philip, and Michael. A Memorial Service was held Sunday, December 10, 2006 at the Atlanta Botanical Gardens where several hundred people gathered to celebrate Mr. Magnuson's life.

Follow your Passion in 2007

Sylvia Hillyard Pannell President

There are matters about which each of us feels strongly. Then there are those things about which we are passionate -- that drive us to action.

In early December 2006, the faculty and students of the Department of Theatre and Film Studies at the University of Georgia staged a protest to demonstrate the need for reengineering what is now a very dangerous intersection adjacent to its departmental home, the Fine Arts Building.

This was in response to an automobile/pedestrian accident when a faculty member was hit by a car, the second such occurrence in as many years. In both cases the person hit was crossing the intersection legally and was badly hurt. Even so, the powers that be remain indifferent to the hazard the intersection presents. These are by no means the only accidents that have occurred at this intersection.

This was a serious problem even before I arrived in 1977. Many have been hit and even more have had very close calls in this dangerous traffic situation.

Finally, in an effort to get something done, we looked to our own

resources. We are, after all, a department of drama. Who is better equipped to stage a protest to call attention to, and propose remediation for, this dangerous situation? It is a time honored application of dramatic resources, isn't it?

There was tremendous enthusiasm for the event. Faculty and students attended organizational meetings and prepared costumes and props. The head of the department of Theatre and Film Studies, Dr. David Saltz, secured the necessary permissions for the demonstration and contacted the press.

For an hour on December 6, from 12:10 to 1:10 p.m., a cadre of students and faculty executed the plan arousing much attention and even some consternation on the part of drivers, pedestrians, and police officers. We received front-page news coverage and hope we called sufficient attention to this critical problem to move toward a reasonable solution.

Another of my passions is Jekyll Island, a beautiful barrier island off the southern coast of Georgia. When Jekyll Island was purchased in 1947 by the state of Georgia from the millionaire owners of the famed Jekyll Island Club, it was designated a state park -- a seaside playground for the people of the state of Georgia -- and it has remained 65% natural and only 35% developed. As such it is a sanctuary for shore birds, loggerhead turtles, sea critters of all sorts, beach flora and fauna, naturalists, and beachcombers. The delicious crustaceans harvested in the surrounding marshes add to the culinary delights of those who visit.

It is an inexpensive destination with activities aimed at delighting citizens of all economic ranks. Alas, after years of offering the public this amenity, this island paradise, seen by developers as Georgia's last frontier is now seriously endangered. It is unfortunate, yet certain, that development will displace the rare shore birds and loggerhead turtles, as well as many many fans of the island.

We who love the island must do all we can to prevent this from happening. Since people with lots of money and political clout are in league with the developers this promises to a tough, frustrating, and potentially heartbreaking battle; but it must be waged.

It is well known that we of the theater and entertainment arts are a passionate bunch. Indeed, we have on occasion been accused of "tilting at windmills." It is in part that very passion that is the bedrock upon which USITT was founded, nurtured, and thrives. Without our love for our profession, our product, our compatriots, our art, and our craft, our volunteer organization would neither exist nor prosper.

As we enter 2007, I offer thanks to those passionate men who founded USITT, a volunteer organization that is approaching its 50th anniversary. I challenge each of you to follow your passions wherever they may lead, and I hope that USITT remains among them. Happy New Year!

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Full Slate of Engineering Sessions for Phoenix

Engineering Commission

The Engineering Commission has put together a wide variety of informative and educational sessions for the USITT Annual Conference & Stage Expo this March in Phoenix.

First is a two-day **Electrical Workshop**. The Engineering Commission has presented an Electrical Workshop at LDI each year since 2001, and presented workshops at the 1991 Conference in Boston and 2001 Conference in Long Beach.

This Professional Development Workshop is designed to give participants an understanding of electricity, accepted methods of power tie-in, use of portable power feeder system, and associated topics including the *National Electrical Code*, *NFPA 70E Standard for Electrical Safety Requirements for Employee Workplaces*, necessary Personal Protection Equipment, and how to avoid accidents and injury when using electrical systems and equipment.

The 2006 event at LDI was sold out, so here's a chance to hone electrical knowledge and skills in Phoenix for half the cost! Participants will receive a copy of NFPA 70E.

Can't make it to this PDW? As part of the Conference there is a session on **Basic Electricity** which will give a small sample of the workshop.

One other session on electricity deals with Personal Protective

Equipment, recent changes in understanding and regulations, and **NFPA 70E**.

Stump the Electrician is back with some different panelists and information on the upcoming 2008 edition of the National Electrical Code.

If electricity isn't your thing, how about rigging and automation? Jay Glerum will present another informative session on rigging in the theatre. Alan Hendrickson will present an Introduction to Automation session to provide a greater understanding of how the characteristics and specifications of machinery components is essential for their selection and use.

Electricity and automation not quite right for you? Jim McHugh will present information and tools for predicting the interaction of light and pigment in **Understanding of Color**. Or there's **Organizational Culture and the Safety Process,** a critical part of an organization's operation.

Do you want to combine elements of all of this? **Cirque du Soleil** will hold two sessions: one to talk about its complex automation and acrobatic rigging, with the top priority of basic principles of safety and reliability; the second session will address career growth opportunities and the need for relevant training programs.

There's no forgetting about control protocols but there's no session on USITT DMX512. This year, the session will focus on the recently approved *Architecture for Control Networks* standard (ANSI E1.17), more commonly known as **ACN**. DMX512 probably will be mentioned, so participants won't have any withdrawal symptoms.

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Lighting Commission Finalizes Phoenix Sessions

Here's an early peek at what the Lighting Commission will present as part of the 47th Annual Conference & Stage Expo in Phoenix, Arizona during March.

Lighting by Tharon Musser will be a roundtable discussion with Tharon Musser's assistant lighting designers, exploring Ms. Musser's many accomplishments. (For the specifics about that session, click <u>here</u>.)

Virtual Scenography in Live Performance: An International

Perspective will give a snapshot of current exemplary work happening around the world in so many exciting and provocative manifestations. Additionally, a short editorial summary will identify some of the emerging technologies to advance this aspect of the art and the hurdles which challenge current and future endeavors.

A series of sessions that deal with various aspects of working in the lighting profession will be presented, from starting out to working at the top of the profession. In **Climbing the Lighting Design Ladder**, young professional designers will talk about how they got started, and what they had to do to break into that first design. **Theatre Lighting Director Overview** features a blueribbon panel of professionals--including David Elliott, Christina Gianelli, Stan Pressner, and Chris Dennis -- who will join Steve Shelley in examining the skills, responsibilities, and tactics of a theatrical lighting director or lighting supervisor. The foursome will discuss contracts and scenarios, and compare the hardware, wetware, and political ware to get the job, keep the job, and survive the job.

In **A Practical Guide to Festival Lighting,** Stan Pressner, Doug Witney, and Steve Shelley (from Lincoln Center Festival, International Festival of Arts and Ideas, and the Spoleto Festival USA, respectively) will examine the skills, responsibilities, and tactics of creating or recreating theatrical lighting in a festival situation. Whether it's a premiere or a remount, lighting a show in this environment is unique and filled with the potential for pitfalls and rewards. The threesome will discuss their jobs and their perceptions regarding incoming shows.

Some of the less flashy but no less important parts of professional work are covered in **Focusing on Accidents.** When loading in and

How do workers stay safe and prevent accidents? What must be done if there is an accident? **Writing the Lighting Renovation Specifications** is something that occasionally needs to be done. Find out the shortcuts and pitfalls from the leading professionals in the field.

A number of sessions will deal with the tools and techniques of the lighting designer. **Drafting Light Plots** is a panel discussion and demonstration of the need to draft light plots that conform to USITT graphic standards. This session will review the current USITT graphic standards and how to apply them to a light plot. Digital technology has affected most aspects of stage lighting, but has it replaced more "traditional" analog technologies? **Analog vs. Digital-Where Are We?** will explore the present and possible future issues of finding balance between digital and analog skills.

The issue of training here and abroad will be discussed in two different sessions. **Asian and European Approaches to Lighting Training** explores the ways in which lighting design training is approached quite differently in other parts of the world. Instructors from European and Asian academies will explain their distinctive approaches to education for the lighting professions.

Closer to home, another session asks, **Are We Giving Students the Skills They Need? Life Beyond Design.** There are a variety of challenging, rewarding, and lucrative employment opportunities in the lighting field, but are students being educated for the vast possibilities for employment beyond being a designer? This session is a roundtable discussion with the folks who do the hiring.

The **Lighting Commission Reception** will allow participants to talk with lots of other lighting people and enjoy some good food and drinks. As always, check the Conference Program for specific times and locations. See you in Phoenix!

Organ Stop Pizza - 1149 East Southern Ave., Mesa, 85204; phone: 480-813-5700

Serves pizza, pasta, and subs, but the main attraction is The Mighty Wurlitzer pipe organ. Organ Stop's Wurlitzer is one of the largest and finest in the world. This massive instrument contains more than 5,500 pipes, numerous percussions, countless traps, and even dancing puppets! It has four turbine blowers that provide the Murals and recently restored period 1950s seating provide part of the appeal at The Stockyard and the 1889 Saloon. wind to create the sound, and the 40-foot ceilings in the restaurant create excellent acoustics. The organists are world-class musicians who perform every half hour during restaurant hours.

Los Dos Molinos - 8646 South Central Ave., Phoenix; phone: 602-243-9113

Serves New Mexican cuisine. Los Dos Molinos is the perfect place for people who like their food hot! Molinos makes the food fresh, and the menu warns, "Sorry we do not provide a mild sauce - I do not know how to make 'mild." The restaurant decor is an authentic hacienda style and features a large patio area that is perfect for enjoying one of the best margaritas in Phoenix before a meal.

Postino Wine Café - 3939 East Campbell Ave. Phoenix; phone: 602-852-3939

Serves antipasto, bruschetta, panini, and salads. One popular panini is the grosso, which contains salami, prosciutto, capocollo, mortadella, and provolone. The space, carved out of the old Arcadia post office ("postino" means "postman" in Italian), has walls that alternate between institutional block and high-gloss panels painted in dark and fashionable colors. Glass garage doors roll open in nice weather turning the restaurant into a giant " Arizona room."

House of Tricks - 114 East 7th St., Tempe; phone: 480-968-1114 Serves "New American," a delicate fusion of French and Southwest flavors. House of Tricks is located in two adjacent houses with an outdoor patio bar and fireplace between them. One house is a small 1920's cottage, and the other is a 1903 brick and adobe house restored to its turn-of-the-century feel. The wine menu is one of the most thorough and affordable in the Valley of the Sun, yet neither the quality nor selection is compromised with a cellar of more than 2,500 bottles.

La Grande Orange Café & Grocery - 4410 North 40th St., Phoenix; phone: 602-840-7777.

Serves French-inspired yet simple American food. The design of the café is innovative, fresh, and contemporary allowing patrons to dine at one of the indoor tables nestled within the store or outdoors in the Java Garden. The café also has a grocery store that offers a variety of convenience items; one-of-a-kind cakes, pastries, and desserts; and rare yet affordable wines. Just around the corner is La Grande Orange Pizzeria, offering simple yet tasty pizzas.

Cyclo - 1919 West Chandler Blvd., Chandler; phone: 480-963-4490

Serves Vietnamese food and regional cuisine, including desserts and regional beverages. Cyclo's location in a strip mall between a dry cleaners and a pharmacy may seem an unlikely location for a culinary treat, but rest assured that there is no better Vietnamese food in the Valley. Not only is the food excellent, but owner and menu designer Justina Duong acts as a goodwill ambassador for her country, bringing her guests little tastes of menu items and urging them to try something new.

Angel Sweet - 1900 West Chandler Boulevard, Chandler; phone: 480-722-2541

Serves Italian gelato. Voted best ice cream shop in Phoenix by *Arizona Republic, New Times, Get Out* magazine, *Sunset* magazine, and *Food and Life* magazine. In 2004, Angel Sweet was chosen as one of the great American ice cream parlors in the nation by the book *Everybody Loves Ice Cream*. Each day they make more than two dozen flavors of fresh gelato, and all ingredients and equipment are imported from Italy.

Stockyards Restaurant and the 1889 Saloon - 5009 East Washington, Phoenix; phone: 602-273-7378 Serves steaks, seafood, and salads. Stockyards is billed as "Arizona's Original Steakhouse" and was recently added to the City of Phoenix Historical Register for both its central role in Arizona's cattle industry and its relevant architectural style. The building was built in 1954 and was recently restored including the original 1950s black leather booths, a pressed-tin ceiling surrounded by etched glass, a stone fireplace, wood shutters, and vintage photos. The 1889 Saloon features a massive, hand-carved mahogany bar and an equally massive cut-glass chandelier. Also in the bar is an 1887 player piano complemented by piped-in country music.

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
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Expo to Feature Many International Exhibits

With her husband Orlin, Ms. Corey co-founded the Everyman Players with the assistance of students from her years at Centenary College in Baton Rouge, Louisana and Georgetown College in Kentucky. In 1983, she and her niece, Suzanne Lockridge, cofounded Irene Corey Design Associates in Dallas, Texas to design soft sculpture costumes for theme parks, movies, and the theatre.

Ms. Corey has written several books including *The Mask of Reality: an Approach to Design for the Theatre* and *The Face is a Canvas: The Design and Technique of Theatrical Make-up.* She received the Thomas DeGaetani Award in 1994, and was the first Honorary Member of the National Costumers Association. In 1995, she gave her entire archive to Arizona State University. Selections from this collection will be presented in a retrospective format. It is appropriate to celebrate Ms. Corey's 80th year by including her exhibit at USITT in Phoenix.

She is a grand lady of design and pioneered many new techniques that should be shown and known to both veteran and new designers. In addition to viewing the exhibit, plan on attending *Irene Corey's Imaginative Journey Continues*, a session being offered by Ms. Lockridge 2 to 3:30 p.m. on Wednesday, March 14.

The idea of exhibiting **John Ezell**'s work came from the Scene Design Commission's Heritage Committee. Mr. Ezell's resume of regional, Broadway, and international design credits are impressive. He is a consultant to Yale's Beinecke Rare Book and Manuscript Library and a participant in the exchange of theatre artists with the People's Republic of China.

His drawings have been exhibited in New York, San Diego, Prague, Brussels, and Beijing. His work received the Award for Experimental Television Art in Milan, the Corporation for Public Broadcasting Award for Excellence, and nine Critics' Circle Awards.

He received Washington University's 2001 Distinguished Alumni Award and was recently inducted into the College of Fellows of the American Theatre at the Kennedy Center in Washington, D.C. During his Fellowship induction presentation, Mr. Exell chose to speak primarily to the students of design, reinforcing the importance of developing sketch skills as a means toward communicating the design and supporting the aesthetic vision of the director.

Through the generous support of the Theatre Institute of Bratislava, Slovakia and Dr. Ladislav Lajcha, USITT will present a tributary exhibit of the work of international artist **Ladislav Vychodil**. Mr. Vychodil's early studies sent him to Prague where he found inspiration in the avant-garde works of the Czech theatre strongly influenced by Myerhold, Brecht, Piscator, and Tairov.

In 1942 Mr. Vychodil became the resident scenographer for the theatre in Beskydy where he worked until 1944 when the theatre was banned. In 1945, at the age of 25, he became chief designer





for the Slovak National Theater as well as head of scenography at		
the Academy of Musical Arts in Bratislava, a position he held		
until his retirement. Mr. Vychodil was a founding member of		
OISTAT serving as Chair of the Scenography Commission. In		
1967, in concert with Josef Svoboda, he initiated the Prague		
Quadrennial.		

Mr. Vychodil designed for theatres around the world including four North American projects. His North American work concluded in 1986 with a set design for an adaptation of *Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde* at the San Diego Repertory Theater. This design won the Gold Medal for Best Scenographic Production at the 1987 Prague Quadrennial. Mr. Vychodil's body of work encompasses well over 300 productions, seven decades, and five continents. He was the complete artist, the consummate teacher, and master of his field.

To round out its special exhibitions, the International Committee is sponsoring an exhibit of work by Bulgarian costume designer **Marina Ratchinova**, Netherlands designer **Warner Van Wely**, Welch scenographer **Sean Crowley**, and Belgian scenic technologist **Chris Van Goethem**.

The design exhibits are presented as a special part of Stage Expo. Make plans to spend time viewing these outstanding collections of work.
