She has worked extensively with OISTAT, the International Organization of Scenographers, Theatre Architects and Technicians. Ms. Howard was one of the originators of and continues to be a force with Scenofest, held in conjunction with the Prague Quadrennial.

Curtain Call Exhibit Highlights Women Theatrical Designers

A new multi-media exhibit in New York City, Curtain Call: Celebrating a Century of Women Designing for Live Performance was unveiled November 17 in the New York Public Library for the Performing Arts' Donald and Mary Oenslager Gallery, 40 Lincoln Center Plaza. A joint project of the Library and the League of Professional Theatre Women, the exhibit spotlights the work of 140 women who designed sets, costumes, lighting, and innovations.

The exhibit runs through May 2, 2009.

The exhibit features treasures from the Library's archives as well as items on loan from the Museum of the City of New York and other individuals and organizations. It was conceptualized and cocurated by award-winning costume designer Carrie Robbins in collaboration with performance historian Barbara Cohen-Stratyner who is the Judy R. and Alfred A. Rosenberg Curator of Exhibitions of the Performing Arts Library. Ms. Robbins' designs for the upcoming Broadway production of *Irving Berlin's White Christmas - The Musical* are included in the show.

Workshops, films screenings, and a full slate of public programs

will be scheduled for early in the year.

Among the hundreds of items on display, visitors of all generations will recognize objects of enchantment from every realm of live performance. There is the gown in which Constance Towers' Anna waltzed with Yul Brynner's King to Shall We Dance? and Glinda's blue Dior-inspired number from Wicked; Richard Burton's casual Hamlet garb; Hume Cronyn's ass's head (as Bottom at Stratford, Ontario); and the wings from Angels in America. Constructions of skill and imagination become Beauty and the Beast's Lumiere on stage, a fire-eyed flying Beelzebub from the Oregon Shakespeare Festival's *Dr. Faustus*,

and a Passion Play Queen Elizabeth so elaborate it comes with a multi-page instruction guide. There are intricate set models from shows and operas which many people have experienced full size including *Spring Awakening*, *Avenue Q*, *Tom Sawyer*, and *An American Tragedy*.

Visitors will see how innovations in lighting developed, from Beatrice Irwin's correspondence with Ruth St. Denis to Jean Rosenthal's legendary lighting plot for *Billy the Kid*, to video demonstrations of the new wave of projection artists.

Several of the designers themselves are present on film and videotape. "To see and hear these women speak about how they came to their work, the people and productions with which they've been involved, and the creative and professional hurdles they've cleared is inspirational," said Joan Firestone, exhibition project director on behalf of the League and past co-president of that organization.

Drawing original materials from the Library's collections as well as items on loan from the Museum of the City of New York, the José Limón Dance Foundation, the Martha Graham Dance Company, several North American regional theatres, and individual designers, the multi-media exhibition features costumes of every kind and era, set models with their accompanying boxes full of handmade miniature denizens and décor, lighting plots, sketches and illustrations, research notes, fabric swatches, presentation renderings, costume bibles, production photographs, props, festival figures, autographed Broadway Bears from Broadway Cares/Equity Fights AIDS, correspondence, and interviews and performance videos.

The exhibition catalogue, edited by Alexis Greene, includes essays by both curators with an introduction by theatre historian Mary C. Henderson; graphic design is by Linda Florio.

Students, do you have a research or design project with an international component? Need funding to travel to a theatre or library collection overseas? The USITT Student International Travel Award is a biennial award offered to students who seek funding for theatre design, technology, and research related international travel. The award amount is \$1,000, and is supported by the Samuel H. Scripps International Fund.

Eligible projects may be developed from a wide variety of topics from research, education, and production assignments to attending theatre festivals. The next round of applications, due on January 7, will be for the award period of March 2009 to March 2010. One award winner will be selected, and the award will be presented at the Annual Conference & Stage Expo in Cincinnati.

Students who are current USITT members with junior, senior, or graduate standing are encouraged to apply for this award. The application is available <u>online</u>. In addition, applicants are asked to compose a project narrative (500 word maximum) describing the project, destination(s), planned timetable, budget, and goals while

overseas. The application should include a letter of recommendation from a current teacher, a resume, and, for design applications, 10 images of recent work. For information and to submit an application, project narrative, and portfolio by e-mail, contact Sandy Bonds at abonds@uoregon.edu.

A report of the project is required by the end of the award year, either in the form of a conference presentation, an article, or other written/visual documentation. Student winners from 2007 will present their research findings at the 2009 Cincinnati Conference & Stage Expo.

Ryan Fletcher, a graduate of Stanford University, traveled to Prague to investigate the intersection between engineering and lighting design. Annelie Thurin, a graduate from the University of Oregon, attended the Prague Quadrennial and Scenofest to document the use of non-traditional, recycled materials, paper, and found objects into costume design.

They will be joined by the Member International Travel Award winner from 2008, Peter Beaudert, who will present his further findings on the exquisite scene painting techniques practiced at the Paris opera in the nineteenth century. This session will be held 12:15 p.m. Friday, March 20.

What Lies Ahead!

The Fall Board and Committee meetings in Las Vegas, Nevada included almost 100 individuals working to advance the mission of the Institute.

In addition to the Board of Directors, which held both a retreat and a business meeting, groups who met included the Publications Committee, the USITT@50 Planning Committee, the Transition Advisory Team (TAT), Membership Committee, Finance Committee, Graphics Advisory Committee, and the Executive Committee. During all those sessions, a huge amount of information was exchanged and much discussion took place on moving USITT forward.

While Wall Street and our economy continue to gyrate at an unsettling pace, USITT continues to find itself on solid financial ground. The snapshot provided by our annual audit indicates that, following our successful conference in Houston, we are able to continue the many important activities of the Institute while moving forward with plans for our 2009 event in Cincinnati and beyond to our 50th anniversary celebration in Kansas City for 2010.

Each day at the 2010 Conference will begin with an all-conference *super* session, led by a major figure in the entertainment industry.

The theme of each Super Session will continue through the morning with breakouts and related events. Dance will be in the spotlight on Wednesday; movies will be in focus on Thursday; theatre will be center stage on Friday; and the future will be explored on Saturday, with emphasis on design and technical solutions.

A special series of web-streamed events is being explored so USITT can include members who cannot be in Kansas City. The celebration also will feature special publications including a history of the Institute by Rick Stephens, and a book about major American designers who were active between 1960 and 2010.

Looking at what lies ahead for USITT, a great deal of time was spent examining our organizational structure and the role that an Executive Director would play in a revised governance model. Following months of research, preliminary work with the Executive Committee in August, and conversations with the Directors at Large, the Transition Advisory Team presented a possible template for a new governance model, including an Executive Director.

The Board, in an effort to solidify plans for a new organizational model, directed TAT to develop a job description for the new position with a timeline for implementation and an accompanying budget as well as a detailed proposal for a new organizational structure that would clearly demonstrate the relationship of committees, Board, Staff, contractors, and Executive Director.

To increase our understanding of structures currently used by other organizations, TAT Chair Lea Asbell-Swanger, USITT Administrative & Finance Manager Carol Carrigan, and I attended the 2008 Boardsource Leadership Forum held the last weekend of October in Washington, D.C. The conference is designed to assist not-for-profit arts organizations with a greater understanding of governance, finance, and regulatory concerns.

We gained valuable information by splitting up and then sharing the information we gathered, attending 18 sessions ranging from finance to governance, board structure to arts fundraising. The wealth of information from that conference is being shared with the Board and TAT as we continue our search for a sustainable and relevant USITT in the 21st century.

This is an exciting time for the Institute as we look for ways to increase our ability to reach new constituencies while at the same time continuing to identify new avenues of service to our highly-valued current members.

During this busy time it is important that we slow down long enough to connect with our friends and loved ones. I sincerely hope that each of you has a safe and memorable holiday.

The featured event of the day was a tour of the newly renovated Hanna Theater, the fifth theatre of Playhouse Square to be renovated and the new home of the Great Lakes Theatre Festival. As one

Following the tour, the group enjoyed a lively panel discussion featuring Tom Einhouse, vice president of real estate development for Playhouse Square; Charlie Fee, artistic director of Great Lakes Theatre Festival; and Paul E. Westlake Jr., FAIA, managing principal of WRL.

During lunch at the offices of WRL, OVS members were treated to an inside look into the world of a major national architectural firm specializing in facilities for the performing and



cultural arts communities. The afternoon included a tour of the Idea Center, a collaboration of public television, public radio, and another WRL project led by Playhouse Square Arts Education Program Coordinator Tony Hanf. There was time to view the impressive display of work by over 40 regional designers – students, teachers, and professionals – submitted for the Peggy Ezekial Awards. 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Draping Bodices, Design in China Featured in Cincy

As everyone works through a fall which seems to be whizzing by, it is hard to remember that registration for the Cincinnati 2009 Conference & Stage Expo has already begun, and it is time to plan the trip. The second day, March 19, has many exciting workshops coming from the Costume Design & Technology Commission.

After time to enjoy the opening of Stage Expo and explore its exhibits, the first costume session on Thursday will start at 12:15 p.m. and is the always popular *Costume Poster Session* chaired by Donna Meester. (See related story here.) This is a juried presentation of posters that involve innovative or creative solutions to topics ranging from research, latest designs, new techniques and products, new uses for existing products, and fabric modification.

The second session begins at 2:30 p.m. and features Han Chuenqi, one of USITT's international guests. He was the costume designer for the closing ceremony of the 2008 Olympics in Beijing. One of the most important costume designers in China, Mr. Han is the dean of the design department of the National Dance Academy of China, and director of the Committee of Costume Design for the OISTAT Center in China.

His artistic talent has been well recognized with numerous national awards. His recent design credits include: the Opening Ceremony of 21th International University Games; the Opening Ceremony of the Kunming International Expo; the Ceremony of the 39th National Anniversary of the Singapore Republic; and the opening ceremony of the East Asia Games. Onstage, he has designed for opera, dance, and musicals for many leading theatre companies in China in performances including *Aida*, *Dream of Dunhuang*, and *The Butterfly*.

The final costume session on Thursday begins at 4:45 p.m.. *Graceful Bodices: Draping over Period Corsets* will be presented by Susan Davis and is a follow-up to her very popular session two years ago on *Draping a Graceful Skirt*. The session will demonstrate draping bodices from the eighteenth and nineteenth centuries, including how to deal with period shapes considering fabric grain, style lines, and proportion. Paper patterns and sleeves



will be discussed, but the primary focus will be methods to create beautiful bodices.

Join the Costume Design & Technology Commission on the second day of the Conference for these exciting sessions. Coming in December: a sneak peak into *Draping in Half Scale*, *Fosshape Armor*, a retrospective on opera designer Robert O'Hearn, *Wardrobe Work on Broadway*, the distinguished achievement honoree, and, of course, the Costume Design & Technology Commission Reception.

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The Costume Poster Session, held each year as part of the Annual Conference, allows both poster presenters and interested attendees to experience a wide variety of information exchange and scholarship.

It's the home stretch for 2008, and those whose ideas will be accepted for the 2009 Costume Poster Session must submit electronic copies of their presentations by March 6. Participants will be notified of acceptance in early December.

The poster session is a time when costume designers and technicians are able to share information that is probably not wellknown, or perhaps of their own invention. This includes, but is not limited to: a new solution to an old problem, a new problem and its solution, a classroom or management technique, the results of research, or other ideas, discoveries, or developments in the field of costuming. All submissions will be juried by the Costume Poster Selection Committee.

Poster presentations are widely accepted as meeting the requirements for scholarly publication. Those employed by an educational institution may be able to get their school to fund some or all of the expenses to the USITT Annual Conference & Stage Expo in Cincinnati. Poster presenters also may have the opportunity to publish their ideas in TD&T.

The deadline to submit abstracts for ideas was November 15. It was earlier than in previous years in response to requests from those who need to know if a proposal has been accepted in order to receive funding.

As excitement and interest in the poster session grows, ways to archive the presentations are being explored. As a result, there will be several guidelines that will need to be followed. Presenters will be sent a list of guidelines when they are notified of acceptance. All presenters **must** submit a copy of their presentation and handouts electronically.

Interested applicants must submit their application, along with supporting materials and fee, postmarked by February 27. Space is limited, applications should be submitted immediately.

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
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
